**THE PARKER OIL FIELD.**—The Cliff well, on Fowler Run, and owned by D. Reynolds & Co., which was doing only 2 barrels, was torpedoed on Monday, and is now producing 15 barrels daily.

It is expected the Denver Pacific will be completed in June, and the Kansas Pacific in October.

**NEWS ITEMS.**

A school teacher in Centre township, Indiana, while punishing a boy on Wednesday became angered at resistance and struck him a furious blow on the head with a heavy ruler. The boy staggered out of school and dropped dead.

John W. Coon, of Omaha, is prepared to play Rudolphe, winner of the champion cue in San Francisco, a match on the return of the latter from California.

A letter from Fort Laramie states that much genuine alarm exists among the settlers regarding the Sioux Indians, reported to be encamped in large numbers on the Powder River, threatening revenge for the murder of one of their band at Fort Laramie last fall.

The condition of S. P. Meehan, editor of the Irish American, who was shot on the night of February 28th, by Dr. Keenan, is becoming more critical every day.

Hester Wimmer, colored, was killed by a blow from the fist of her husband, in Philadelphia, Wednesday night, because she interfered to prevent him beating her child, a girl of thirteen. The murderer was arrested.

W. H. Traubel, a Philadelphia lithographer, has been arrested, charged with engraving counterfeit brewer's stamps. Forty thousand dollars worth of plates and stamps were captured.

The Passenger depot and freight office of the Pacific Railroad at Jefferson City, Mo., were burned Thursday afternoon, together with the books of the office and \$2,000 worth of freight. Loss on building, \$4,500 with an open insurance policy.

The principal officers of Cincinnati are on a visit to Philadelphia, to examine in the workings of the public school system.

Harper, the Sandwich incendiary, committed suicide in the Barnstable, Mass., jail Thursday morning.
