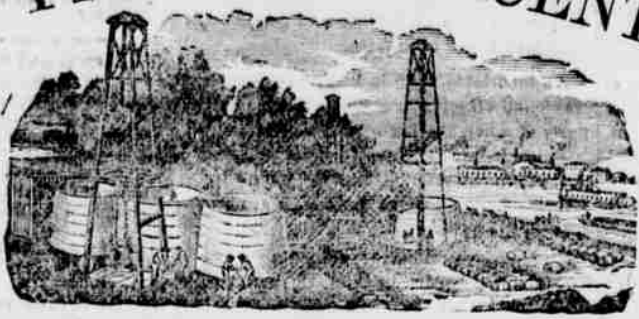

ment of Colorado cattle over the road has
just taken place. There are now 10,000 at
Kit Carson awaiting shipment. A fast
night express train is to be put on the road,
making the time from Kansas City to Denver
in six hours. Work is now being vigorously
pushed on seven different lines in Kansas.
