Petroleum Items from all Sources.

A new well was struck on the R. L. Shaw Farm on Friday last, and is now pumping 25 barrels daily. This territory is generally looked upon by the operators as very favorable. The new well is owned by F. W. Andrews, of Pioneer. A new well was struck on Thursday of last week on Middleton run, one-fourth of a mile from the river, and one and a half mile from Emlenton, which is producing forty-five barrels of oil per day.

The Cliff well, on Fowler Run, and owned by D. Reynolds & Co., which was doing only 2 barrels, was torpedoed on Monday, and is now producing 15 barrels daily. The Niagara, Reynolds & Co., on the Wm. Parker tract below Church Run, which was producing about 18 barrels, was torpedoed last week and is now yielding 30 barrels daily.

We copy the following items from the Forest Press: On Thursday last, on information of Mr. Loomis of Clarion, Constable Tietzworth arrested a man with a half dozen aliases for horse stealing, tied and delivered him to the Clarion authorities.

A little daughter of Francis Hopler, about 6 years of age, was badly burned about the face and arms, by his clothes accidentally taking fire, on Saturday last, near Newmansville, in Ticonderoga.

The Philadelphia Post says: On Saturday last George Kepler, the owner of several oil producing wells in Venango county, and a resident of Parker's Landing, came here on a visit. George, while there, was done out of three hundred dollars, as he avers, by Mrs. Firth. After pleading with her for a while he induced her to return him twenty dollars to pay his board bill and fare homeward.
