The new bridge across the Mississippi at St. Paul has been completed and accepted by the city.

The Missouri, Kansas and Texas railroad company built one hundred miles of road in about seven months last year, and have purchased iron and made arrangements to beat that this year.

A steamer commenced regular trips Tuesday between Detroit and Malden, at the mouth of the river.

Affidavits have been published by Conductor Adams and Engineer Kill, of the ill-fated train on the Mississippi Central Railroad, which ran through Lucker's trestle, setting forth the fact that the train was not running faster than schedule time; that the accident evidently was the result of breaking an axle of the express car, and that the bridge was not unsound as had been reported. The latter is substantiated by a number of persons connected with the road, including the Section Master of that portion.
