AN IMPORTANT DECISION .-- On Tuesday, the 22 t instant, in the case of H. R. Kemp va. The United States Petroleum Co., Judge Trunky in his charge to the jury held that the oil reserved as royalty to the owner of the land by the leases in ordinary use, is rent, and can be distrained for when unpaid, and collected by landlord's warrant.

This is the first decision of this question, and will be of interest to both land owners and lessers in the oil region.




