**Block Coal.**—We have a fine specimen of block coal which was found by Mr. John Young, of Rymilton, on land belonging to himself and John P. McKinley Esq., near Hadley's Station, on the line of the Jamestown and Franklin Railroad. It is said to be equal to the best quality of English coal, now imported in large quantities, for smelting and other purposes. The vein is from three and a half to four and a half feet thick and free from sulphur. The apparent excellent quality of this coal and the facilities for transportation indicate a rich harvest for the owners of the land, and will promote further developments in the neighborhood of the new mine.—Franklin Spectator.

**OIL MATTERS NEAR FRANKLIN.**—Parker & Spencer torpedoed their new well on the Smith farm on Monday—increasing its production from one barrel to five barrels per day.

Nims & Co., near the A. & G. W. Depot, torpedoed a dry hole on Monday and are now getting three barrels per day.—Spectator.
