The lumber trade on the Allegheny River is very active at present. A large amount of oil is also being shipped to Pittsburgh .-Steamers having in tow barges arrive at Oll City almost daily. There is about six foot of water in the river.

Special Examiner John A. Wilson, Esq., appointed by the U. S. District Court at Pettaburgh, to take evidence in the steel jar caso, in which Bryan, Dillingham & Co. of Titusville, are the complainants, and Fisher, Norris & Co. of this place, respondents, commenced taking testimony in the case at the o ntral House, to-day. The case is an impertant one as it involves the manufacture and use of sicel jars in drilling oil wells for several years. Geo. H. Christey, Esq., of Pittsburgh, appears for complainants and M. A. Woodward, Esq., of Pittsburgh, for respondents.

A run or was current on the sircets last evening that a one thousand barrel well had been struck at Brady's Bend, near Parker's Landing. To-day we learn that the well starte I up at that rate until the head flowed off, when it rapidly decreased and is now yielding only 75 barrels per day. Petroleum Items from all Sources Four new wells are going down upon the Benedict Farm near Enterprise. This farm

near Tidionte, is doing about 60 barrels per day. Though no leases have been given upon this farm, nearly all the adjoining territory has been bought up by operators, and large developments are in progress.

The well put down upon the point of the bloff near the Upper Mill, a short distance below Titusville, and near the junction o Pine and Oil Creek, is doing about three barrels per day.

A new well was strack last week upon the Chicago tract, owned by Mcreis. Kernochan & Boyer. The production at first reached but about 20 bbls. daily. It was torpedoed, and has since produced at the rate of nearly 100 bbis. per day.

Well No. 4 on the Clark farm, Shamburgh, belonging to Mej. Hopkins of Tidioute, was torpedord Friday and is now pro-

ducing six y barrels. The production of the Tidioute oil region continues undiminished. For the week ending April 14, the production at Tidioute was 7,210 barrels; shipments 14,709 barrels; in tank 42,287 barrels. The production at Hickory for the same period was 1,825 bbis; shipmeats 1,892 bbis; in tank 3,229 bbls. In the immediate vicinity of Tidioute there is not much change in the production of the wells.
