Petroleum Items from all Sources

Four new wells are going down upon the Benedict Farm near Enterprise.

The Clapp well on the Henderson farm, near Tidoute, is doing about 60 barrels per day.

The well put down upon the point of the bluff near the Upper Mill, a short distance below Titusville, and near the junction of Pine and Oil Creek, is doing about three barrels per day.

A new well was struck last week upon the Chicago tract, owned by Morris, Kernochan & Boyer.

Well No. 4 on the Clark farm, Sham-burgh, belonging to Maj. Hopkins of Tidoute, was torpeded Friday and is now producing sixty barrels.

The production of the Tidoute oil region continues undiminished. For the week ending April 14, the production at Tidoute was 7,210 barrels.

Navigation is fully open on Lake Erie.

Contracts have been made to carry wheat from Buffalo to New York, lighters free, for twelve cents a bushel.

After the 25th inst., American silver will be received by the Dominion Government at 5 1/2 per cent discount.

Lake Champlain is open to navigation.

The Nova Scotia Legislature is to be prorogued to-day.

The schooner Mercury went ashore Saturday morning, twelve miles south of Cape Henry. No lives lost.

The yield of quicksilver on the Pacific coast in 1869 was 18,898 flasks.

Rich gold discoveries are reported at Siskiyon, Eldorado county, California.

The Expedition from Canada to the Red River country will number ten thousand picked men, including a steel battery and the Rocket Brigade, as well as two thousand loyal Indians.

The New Orleans ship Kate Prince, from Bristol, England, has arrived at New York, and reports that she picked up on the 12 of April, in latitude twenty-six degrees and twenty-two minutes west, the crew of the schooner Emma, from New York for Galveston.

The First Congregational Church and several adjoining building in Nashua, N. H., were burned Saturday night. Loss \$100,000.

The British Government is to bear all the expenses of the Red River expedition.—The troops are all to be raised in the Dominion, to serve two years, and on being disbanded each volunteer will be entitled to a grant of land.
