Mr. Editor:—I notice a communication in the Titusville Herald of this morning, signed "Sand Rock No. 2." Now I do not know who Sand Rock No. 2 is, and care less, but one thing I do know and that is that he "digressed" a good ways off the belt in reporting the production of wells in this vicinity.

The above is a specimen of the manner in which No. 2 Sand Rock "digresses" off the belt. The production of all the other wells reported by him is also underrated. It proves conclusively that Sand Rock No. 2 knows nothing whatever of the production of the territory in this vicinity, and it is extremely doubtful if he ever saw it.

HORRIBLE BUTCHERY.

Mrs. Catharine Marsh left her house at Baltimore, Thursday afternoon, borrowed a butcher knife, went to the school near by called out her son James, aged eight, cut his head nearly off, rushed for another little boy named Barnett, who ran and escaped. She then returned home, went into the yard, seized another son William, aged seven, from a swing, and cut his throat; then grasped her daughter, Mary Jane, aged four years, and cut her head completely off; then went into the house and cut the throat of her youngest child, George, aged two years, nearly severing the head from the body; then cut the throat of her own mother, Mrs. Duryea, aged fifty-four years; so badly that she will die. Mrs. Marsh was arrested and taken to the station house. Her husband has been absent some eighteen months in search of employment. He is believed to be working as a barber in New York. Mrs. Marsh always bore an excellent character. She is undoubtedly insane, and Thursday night appeared conscious of her terrible deed.

NEWS ITEMS.

The Massachusetts House of Representatives Thursday voted in favor of repealing the reading and writing clause of the State Constitution.

Gov. Hoffman, in a message to the New York Senate, urges the adoption of the resolution for the payment of the anti-war debt in coin.

The remains of Gen. Arson Burlingame were Thursday deposited in Faneuil Hall, Boston. The public will be admitted today.

The Massachusetts House passed the ten hour labor bill.

Father Richoit and Alfred Scott, the Red river delegates, are still in prison at Ottawa.

The small-pox at Tucson, Arizona, has subsided. The mining news is favorable. The Indians are more quiet, confining their operations to cattle stealing.

The excitement about the new silver mines in New Mexico is increasing. Already there are over 300 men at the mines.

A young lady of Wheeling, named McCollach, attempted suicide Wednesday, by jumping into the Ohio river, but was rescued in a senseless condition.

The Keystone Oil Works, at Pittsburgh, was destroyed by fire on Thursday last. The Commercial says:

It appears that the night worker was engaged about a quarter to eight o'clock pumping crude oil from some bulk boats lying in the river into the receiving tanks located in the still house. He was carrying about a lamp in his hand, and discovered that something was out of order about the engine.

About 200 barrels of refined oil were destroyed and a small quantity of crude. Loss about \$5,000.

EMLENTON OIL DISTRICT.—A correspondent says: "The oil excitement on Middleton Run, one mile above Emlenton, is still increasing. Since the opening of spring a number of new wells have commenced operations. The Chestnut Grove well is still going at the rate of 12 barrels, and increasing. I think from present indications Middleton Run will excel Scrubgrass this summer.—Venango Spectator.
