LEGISLATION FOR VENANGO COUNTY.

In addition to titles of bills already published, passed by the Legislature relative to Venango County, are the following: An act to amend an act approved April 8th, 1868, relating to liens of mechanics, material men, upon leasehold estates, and property there on in the county of Venango, and supplement the acts, approved March 8th, 1869.

NEWS ITEMS.

The Canadian volunteer corps in active service is to be disbanded immediately, except those on the frontier. The steamer Etna, from Liverpool arrived at Boston Saturday. The remains of Hon. Anson Burlingame were interred at Mt. Auburn Saturday, with impressive Masonic ceremonies.

Recruiting for the navy has been resumed at the Brooklyn navy yard. Gen. Gustar will command a force of cavalry which is sent to leave Fort Hayes, to operate against degrading Indians. Charles Holzman, for many years Cashier of the Postman's Saving Institution at St. Louis, died Saturday.

Two cars of fine horses from New York, and destined for Dr. James L. Thayer's new Circus which exhibits in this city on May 21 and 23, passed through this city on Saturday. Among the number was the celebrated running horse "Midnight," and the Kentucky thorough bred "Perseus." The animals are the property of Mr. Wm. THE INQUEST AT TARENTON.—Coroner Clawson returned from Tarenton on Saturday, having held an inquest on the body of the colored boy Henry Gibson, who was drowned off the Oil Valley railroad at Emlenton not long since. A verdict of accidental drowning was rendered. The body of the father was also recovered, and both have been brought here for interment.

A cheeky individual in Ohio, of great nerve, was sentenced to death, got his sentence commuted to imprisonment for life, was pardoned, arrested again for swindling, released through a flaw in the indictment, and now brings suit for \$20,000 damages for false imprisonment.
