The West Virginia Oll Field.

[From the Wirt County Democrat]

"he Shattuck well, on he river, has been aggreed energetically for the past three vecks, and -xhibits signs of yielding oil sgalo. It throws an immense amount of vater, and the machinery is severely taxed, but when the water is exhausted pays Gite a little excitement exists in regard

to the secent strike of Mr. James on the hill between his old well and what is now known as the "Hol day well." This new well wan suck to the depth of nine hundred feet last nummer but has produced but little oil. A short time ago Mr. James resolved, to sink it fifty feet deeper; but when one foot was completed it commenced flowing, tubing ves then put in, and for the first twelve bours it flowed forty barrels. The seed- glasses. bag, however, was delective, and it was retubed on Monday, the projuction since which we are unable to state; but from what we can learn from those who have visued it, an estimate of from fifty to sixty barrels a day is considered no exaggeration. This demonstrates that oil has not left West Virginia, and that Burning Springs territory is but partially developed. We trust all new wells put down after this date will be cosed from the surface as this has been. We learn this course will be pursued by Messis. Braidon & Whitney now about ready in their new enterprise at the bead of the Right hand Fork.

The old Wyatt well, near the "Wirt House," is now producing finely under the management of Mr. John Hosey. Like the Shattuck, Mr. Hosey has to pump a very large amount of water before being rewarded with even a smell of oil.

The old Braiden well, obstructed by tools, lubing, &c., for the past three or four months, is almost cleaned, and Mr. Sherman thinks will be all right again in a short time. Mr. McConaughy also reports good progress in his well on lease No. 208 and hopes to have it pumping next week. On this well depends also the Fitch (lot 195) and Porter (208); both these are mady o start at any time, and will do so as soon as Mr. Mc Jonaughy's well is ready.

The Colorado well, of which we spoke last week as being about ready to start, is now producing an amount estimated at from eight to twelve barrels per day.

The Cincinnati or Staley well, which has flowed steadily for the past year, is now being pumped and yields about ten barrels.

The production of oir for the past week has varied but little from that of the week before; the present amount being estimated at two hundred and twenty-five barrels .-This does not include the new strike of Mr. James, mentioned elsewhere. Prices, too, have remained about the same, being from \$4 to \$4,20 pr barrel. In the middle of the week, however, with a prospect of a rise in the river and an advance in Pittsburgh better prices were offered and paid.
