No. 3 - Purse \$1,125 for all horses. \$400 to the first, \$300 to the second, \$225 to the third and \$100 to the fourth.

No. 4 - Purse \$200 for horses that have never beaten 2:41, 2:50 to the first, \$100 to the second and \$50 to the third.

All the above races are mile heats, best three in five, in harness, and will be run under the rules of the National Association for the promotion of the interests of the association trotting turf. A horse distancing the field shall only be entitled to the first premium.
