FIRST DAY.

No. 1.-Purse \$400 for horses owned in Venango and Crawford counties sixty days previous to the closing of the entries, that have never trotted before this; 2-85; 3-50; to the first, \$125 to the second and \$75 to the third horse.
No. 2.-Purse \$300 for paces; \$175 to the first, \$85 to the second, and \$40 to the third.

SECOND DAY.

No. 3.-Purse \$1,175. Free for all horses. \$400 to the first, \$500 to the second, \$175 to the third and \$40 to the fourth.
No. 4.-Purse \$400 for horses that have never beaten 2:44. \$250 to the first, \$50 to the second and \$50 to the third.

All the above races are mile heats, best three in five, in harness, and will be conducted under the rules of the National Association for the promotion of the interests of the American trotting turf. A horse distancing the field shall only be entitled to the first premium.
The entries will close at Oil City on Saturday June 11, at 9 P. M.
