THE LATEST EUROPEAN NEWS.

THE SITUATION MORE ALARMING.

WAR INEVITABLE.

FRANCE DECLARES WAR.

PARIS, July 15. A dispatch dated noon says: War has been declared by the Corps Legislatif.

The intervention of the great Powers has been ineffectual. Napoleon will announce to-day its rupture of relations between France and Prussia and a declaration of war official.

BERLIN, July 15—3 p. m. Hostilities have already begun.

MUNICH, July 15—3 p. m. The Bavarian Government announces it will remain neutral, but the King and his people would not separate themselves from Germany.

PARIS, July 15. Holland will remain neutral in the struggle. The belligerents have engaged to respect the neutrality of Belgium.

It is reported the Emperor has received a dispatch from Queen Victoria this morning making a last appeal for peace, and a similar dispatch was also sent to the King of Prussia.

It is said a proclamation has been signed by Napoleon and prepared for distribution throughout the German States as soon as the French troops cross the frontier. It asserts to the German people that France wars against Prussia, not Germany, and with no idea of conquest.

PARIS, July 15—3 p. m. The excitement is very great, but no opposition to the war is manifested by any class.

LONDON, July 15—Evening. It is reported the Prussian Government itself demanded of France the recall of Benedetti, and that European powers yesterday united in a protest against the implacability of Prussia, but without effect.

New Well.—A new well was struck on the Story farm flats, on the bank of the Creek opposite Tarr farm, yesterday, which is said to be yielding ten barrels per day.

The weather is fearful hot to-day.

OIL NEWS.—BIG WELLS.—The Lackawanna well No. 4, on Shaffer Run, struck several days ago, is pumping 70 barrels a day.

The Hasson well No. 14, struck last week was torpedoed on Tuesday last, and is producing 150 barrels daily. This well is a few hundred feet from the Lackawanna well.

The Reno Company's big well is doing 50 barrels a day, and has been pumping that amount steadily for the last three weeks.

THE NEW PRESBYTERY OF ERIE.—At the first meeting of this Presbytery since its reorganization, held on Saturday last, the following officers were elected: Moderator, Rev. J. R. Findlay, of Mercer; Stated Clerk, Rev. S. M. J. Eaton; Temporary Clerk, Rev. Joseph Vance; and Treasurer, Rev. C. Kimbal.
