Two More New Wells.—Well No. 4,

Water Kiefer & Potts twenty-five acre tract, Duluth farm, commenced pumping about six o'clock last evening, and is now yielding twenty-five to thirty barrels per day.

The Wells, Hugg and Perkins well, Wm. McShay farm, mention of which we made a day or two since, having three hundred feet of oil in the hole, was completed and commenced testing yesterday afternoon.

It started up a lively rate and kept it up for about four hours when the valves became clogged up and the tubing had to be drawn for the purpose of cleaning the well out.

Up to this afternoon pumping has not commenced. There is no doubt but that it will be a good well.

Latest and Most Important War News.

London, July 21. It is believed here that the Prussians are short of ammunition; that the French know it, hence the great activity of their movements.

Turkey offers France 200,000 soldiers for pay. The ditches around the forts at Mayence have been filled with water, and the works at that place are considered impregnable.

The British government is considering the question of dispatching troops across the channel to preserve the neutrality of Belgium.

The French government has been notified that the Kingdoms of Wurtemberg and Bavaria will join Prussia.

Berlin correspondence says: Thanks to her organization, Prussia will in a few hours be equal to France at all points. Colleges and schools are closed, and the students are thronging recruiting offices.

The French fleet has passed through the Sounds and entered the Baltic. Paris, July 20. The representatives of foreign powers here made another united effort to-day to prevent war, but were unsuccessful.

Madrid journals advise neutrality for Spain. London, July 21. The statement made yesterday that the English government intends to dispatch a body of troops to protect Belgium is generally discredited.

The Levant Herald of to-day announces that the first class of Reserves have been called under arms. This, with the regular force, makes the Turkish army 300,000 strong.

Bismarck informed the North German Parliament yesterday that the declaration of war was the first and only announcement officially received from France, reasoning conclusively that surprise was intended.

It is still believed here that Austria will maintain passive neutrality, without arming. London, July 21. The dates from Paris are to noon. No news of any engagement.
