ANOTHER BIG WELL ON THE MCCRAY FARM.

It will be remembered that we made mention in our issue of Saturday that the Donaghy well, on the Jas. S. McCray farm, was nearly completed. It was finished six o'clock Saturday evening; tubed ring the night, and pumping commenced 7 o'clock yesterday morning. The well started up at the rate of 250 barrels per day, and may be safely set down as a good 150-barrel well. It is owned by Thomas Donaghy and Jas. S. McCray, and is located on the land adjoining that upon which the Lady Corinna well - in which the tools are stuck - is situated. The oil territory in the vicinity of Petroleum Centre takes the lead so far.

There is little chance to be placed in the Antwerp market these days. Saturday our dispatches quoted that market at 43 1/2, while our dispatches this morning say that on that day oil was quoted at 50 1/2 in Antwerp.

During the heavy storm yesterday a number of derricks were blown down in this vicinity.

The Wells, Hoag and Perkins well, Wm. McCray farm, is only yielding about three barrels per day.

The Oil City Daily Times made its appearance again this morning. We welcome it back to the newspaper ranks, and trust it may never meet with a like calamity.

Latest and Most Important War News.

New York, July 23.

The Tribune has the following special from London, July 23, 11 p. m.: Army movements on both sides are slow. Our special correspondent writes from Berlin on the 20th instant that Prussia was actually taken by surprise. Nobody contemplated war; hence the concentration of the forces was less advanced than with the French. Nor will Von Moltke be hurried. There are two methods of mobilizing the Prussian army; the quicker is when regiments march as they are, not waiting for the reserves, which follow when ready; the more regular method is when regiments await their reserves till their ranks are full. The latter and slower method has now been adopted, showing that Prussia is in no dread of the threatened invasion. No soldier of the famous corps of Prussian Guards has yet left Berlin. The infantry reserves were arriving on Tuesday, and regiments are expected to march on Friday. The enthusiasm and confidence increase daily. The feeling throughout Germany is only comparable to that of the North when Sumter was attacked. Still, the financial and commercial distress is terrible, and there are innumerable failures of old and strong houses.

It is perfectly understood in Berlin that Germany, if victorious, will march to Paris. Railroad freight traffic has ceased, and passenger traffic closes on the 24th. Göttingen University is closed, and all the students have enlisted. From Bonn, 300 are expected. All the universities will soon close.

London, July 21. The following dispatch has been received from Paris: Forbach, Department of Moselle, July 23. The Prussians have been repulsed at Carling and a reconnaissance on Prussian soil has been made by French troops.

Paris, July 23. Austria complains of war measures which stop traffic on the land of Constance. Berlin, July 23. The river Rhine is still open to public travel. The Prussian headquarters are now at Kreuznach, eight miles south of Bingen on the river Naack.

Paris, July 23. The Journal Official to-day publishes a proclamation of the Emperor to the people of France. A country poet, after looking about over life, has come to the following rhyming conclusion.

At Corry on Wednesday night about 12 o'clock a bold thief stole into the Downer House bar room while the bar-tender sat out on the veranda in front, and carried away the silver ware that is kept upon the counter. The goods stolen are valued at some \$50 or \$60.

The authorities at Alphen, Belgium offer during the coming great fair "a bonnet to the lady who can drink the greatest quantity of beer in a given time."

A boy named Elmer, was run over by a horse and buggy, on the McBride farm, a day or two since, and severely injured.

Thomas K. Jenkins, of Halifax, who was prosecuted for libel in asserting that the lost Inman steamship City of Boston was unseaworthy and overloaded, is raising a fund to carry on the trial, and professes entire confidence in his ability to prove the charges.

A type-setting match, between C. C. Wall of Toledo, and G. A. Barber of Detroit, took place in Toledo on Saturday. The match is for \$500 and the proceeds of the exhibition. The type to be used is nonpareil; time six hours.
