PRODUCTION OF THE McCRAE FARM

The Jas. S. McCray farm which two weeks ago had a daily production of not over 53 barrels, is to-day yielding 603 barrels per day. The 53 barrels of oil spoken of above is produced from the Isabella wells No. 1 and 2, the McCray and Thompson wells No. 1 and 2, and the Mt. Moriah well. Two weeks since the Kepler or R. E. Lee well was struck, which started up at the rate of 150 barrels per day steadily increasing to 200 barrels which it is now yielding. The McCray & Donaghy well, struck Sunday morning is claimed by many to be doing to-day 400 barrels but we place her at 350 per day, making a daily yield for the farm of 603 barrels. These two wells, together with the Banner well on the Dalzel farm, which is close by, are yielding almost 1,000 barrels per day. Can anybody wonder at the excitement at this point, or that people are migrating from other sections to Petroleum Centre.

HOW IS THIS FOR HIGH?

Yesterday Mr. J. S. McCray gave out a 1-acre lease on his farm, on the following terms: \$1,500 bonus; one-half royalty and reserving one-half the working interest, equal together to three-fourths of all the oil or \$3,000 bonus. If there is any other territory in the oil region that commands so large a figure as the above we would like to hear of it.

C. P. Eaton, of Titusville, has commenced testing a hundred acre tract, the J. S. Cheoney farm situated one mile north of Enterprise. Mr. Eaton took the first lease in the Pleasantville territory and put down the first well, the old Spiritual well, but by some sort of hocus-pocus was swindled out of his rights and left here much poorer than he came.—Pleasantville Gaslight.

Latest and Most Important War News.

London, July 25—4 p. m. No report of any general engagement received.

Paris, July 25—p. m. No report of a battle has yet been received, and none is expected for some days yet.

London, July 25. The inhabitants of Norderoy and other islands near the mouth of the Elbe have all removed in order to leave the French fleet in those waters without experienced pilots.

Information has been received that on Sunday a body of German lancers passed the border near Saarbruck, and tore up the rails for a long distance on the Metz Railroad, destroyed a viaduct and returned to their camp without loss.

A French force is concentrating at Dunkirk, on the coast, near the Belgian frontier.

The journals of Metz say the French have taken forty prisoners so far.

Great difficulties are experienced in getting supplies forward, not only from Paris but from the country about Metz. All horses belonging to inhabitants have been seized. Even meat and vegetables are beginning to fail. This indicates the French movements may be still for some time delayed.

A correspondent writing from Paris says: Prussian troops are passing through the Black Forest toward Basle. Several detachments were stopped by Swiss authorities, who have an observation corps of 25,000 soldiers.

General McMahon's headquarters were at Strasbourg. A strong French force was massing to prevent surprise through the Vosges Defiles. Troops are pouring into Strasbourg from Besonson and everything indicates the first great blow will be struck in the vicinity of Strasbourg. A great force has already arrived at Strasbourg, all of which had been transported by railroad.

A French frigate has been dispatched to the Scottish coast to recruit seamen from the fisheries.

The French War Office is taking extraordinary precautions to preserve secrecy.—Bureau chiefs are prohibited from holding intercourse with persons outside. All instructions proceed direct from the Minister of War, and not through subordinates.

Miss Lottie McAhee, the winner of the boat race at Pittsburgh, is thus described by the Commercial: "Miss McAhee, a plump girl of sixteen, looked really beautiful in her jaunty little red jacket and white dress. Her costume consisted of a tight fitting searlet jacket without sleeves, a loose dress reaching to her knees, white tights, and high boots. After the race Miss McAhee pulled quietly up to the shore and stepped gracefully from the scull boat, apparently as proud as an empress. She threw a water proof over her head and shoulders, and made her way with difficulty through the crowd of congratulating friends, up the bank, where a carriage was waiting to convey her home."

Mrs. Fagundas, late owner of the Fagundas farm, at West Hickory, died at that place on Saturday last. Her funeral was held on Sunday, and while the services were being held one of the daughters died. The family had been suffering with the measles. The widow leaves a legacy of \$250,000, to be divided among three daughters and two sons.
