As we stated in our issue of yesterday, Cody & Thompson well No. 1, commenced pumping about 7 o'clock last evening, oil coming to the surface almost immediately. The well is now producing nearly 300 barrels per day. She had 42 feet of third and rock, and is something over 700 feet deep. It is owned bd Cady & Thompson.

1,200 barrels per day. The Phillips & Boyles well, struck yesterday, is yielding mear 250 barrels per day.
