PUBLIC MEETING!

There will be a meeting of the citizens residing on the Egbert farm, at the office of Chas. Paine, on the farm, at 7 1/2 p. m. this evening, for the purpose of taking measures for the prevention of fires. A general attendance is requested.

FIRE AND BURNING ACCIDENT.

This morning, Mr. George Stevens, one of the owners of the Monitor Oil Works, in Wild Cat Hollow, was dangerously burned by an explosion of gas at the refinery. Mr. S. was in the gas house at work when from some unexplained cause the gas exploded with fearful force, completely enveloping him in flames. He ran out down the hill for some distance when fortunately one of the workmen met and pushing him over into the bushes succeeded in extinguishing the fire on his person, but not until he was seriously if not fatally burned. His face and arms are frightfully burned, and it is feared he inhaled the flame inwardly. Had it not been for the fact that his clothing was woolen fabric, he would undoubtedly have been burned alive. The workman who put out the fire had one of his hands badly cut. The gas house was destroyed.

DASTARDLY OUTRAGE.

Mr. Jos. Shoote, a workman for Mr. N. B. Parker, the well known contractor for sinking oil wells, while going on tour about 1 o'clock this morning, was attacked by three unknown ruffians on the Egbert Farm bridge, knocked down and terribly beaten about the head and a portion of his teeth kicked out. While two of the men were engaged in beating Shoote, the third one interfered and the three made off over the flat and disappeared. It is supposed the men made a mistake and attacked the wrong man, as Shoote is a quiet inoffensive man who would do injury to no man, and had no money with him at the time. It is to be hoped the perpetrators of this outrage will be arrested and punished. Query—Where were the police?

ANOTHER BIG WELL!

ARNOLD, PHINNEY & DEROUSSE WELL NO. 1, PUMPING NEAR 300 BARRELS PER DAY!

THE McCRAY FARM YIELDING 1,400 BARRELS PER DAY!

Arnold, Phinney and Derousse well No. 1, J. S. McCray farm, commenced pumping at seven o'clock last evening, and is now yielding nearly 300 barrels per day. This well is the fifth one that has been tested on this farm within the past few days all of which have proved first-class wells. It has 45 feet of third sand rock, and a very strong volume of gas. It is owned by Messrs. Thos. Arnold, H. B. Phinney and H. Derousse of this place, all pioneer operators and well worthy of this good luck.

It will be remembered that these gentlemen were the first ones to offer the bonus of \$1,000 for leases on the McCray farm, many scouting the idea as ridiculous and foolish in the extreme. Subsequent events, however, have proven that their ideas in regard to the territory were correct, and the movement a wise one.

The production of the wells on the McCray farm, new and old, now reaches nearly 1,400 barrels per day.

Thursday, August 12th, is the time fixed upon for the meeting of the Congressional conferees of this district, and they will meet at Greenville. Col. Dick has appointed for his conferees Col. O. Latest and Most Important War News.

Berlin, August 5.

The following dispatch has been received here from Niederatterback, a small village on the other river, near Weisenburg, dated 6 o'clock, Thursday evening.

We have won a brilliant but bloody victory.

The left wing was the attacking body and constituted 1 of the 5th and 11th Prussian Corps, with the second Bavarian.

This force carried by an assault under the eyes of the Prince Royal, the fortress of Weisenburg and the heights between Weisenburg and Gueburg.

De Oary's division of Marshal McMahon's Corps was defeated, being driven from its camp, and Gen. De Oarys himself was killed.

500 prisoners were taken; none of the m were wounded, many Turcos were among the captured.

The Prussian General Kirchbach was slightly wounded.

The Royal Grenadiers and 50 Regiment of the line suffered heavy losses.

London, August 5.

The victory of the Prussian Crown Prince in the capturing of Weisenburg and Geisler, was brilliant but bloody.

The French were repulsed and dispersed, leaving behind them Gen. De Oarys, killed, and five hundred prisoners, and wounding many Turcos.

The Prussians captured one cannon, and their commander, Kirchbach was slightly wounded.

London, August 5.

The Prussian headquarters are at Treves.

A French corps is said to have moved last night on Saar Louis, where a battle was expected.

The rumor of the capture of the town is not confirmed.

It is said a cavalry skirmish occurred near Lauterbourg yesterday, in which 25 French defeated 150 Prussians.

Nienkerb, near Treves, August 5.

The French on Tuesday shelled Saarbrucken station.

The engines, cars, &c., were saved.

Paris, August 5.

At one o'clock yesterday afternoon the regiments of General Deoay's division and a brigade of light cavalry were attacked at Weisenburg by a very considerable force of the enemy, which had been massed in the woods skirting the Lauter river.

Our troops resisted for several hours the attacks of the enemy and then retired to the summit of Pigeonnier, an eminence which commands the line of railroad to Bitsch.

Gen. Deoays was killed.

One piece of artillery, the horses having been killed and the carriage broken, fell into the hands of the Prussians.

Marshal McMahon is concentrating the forces under his command at Weisenburg.

Frankfort, August 5.—Noon.

A train has just arrived bringing 500 French prisoners from Weisenburg.

They will be sent to Northern Prussia.

The total number of prisoners taken by the Prussians in the fight is 800, including 18 officers.

Real, the murderer, was executed in New York, yesterday morning. There was no excitement.

The Nathans murder mystery, in New York remains unravelled. Rewards amounting to \$40,000 have been offered for the arrest of the murderers.
