MONTHLY OIL BEPORT.

We give below our usual monthly oil report for the month of July. During the month there has been a large increase in the production of several of the farms in this vicinity. The average of the McCray farm for the month of July is 203 barrels per day against 53 barrels for the month of June.-There is an increase of about 40 barrels on the Daizell tarm, and 50 barrels on the Average daily production. rm. On other t farms the production shows a falling off, especially on the Woods, Bainey, and several farms on Cherrytree Run. The low price of oil at present will occasion the shutting down of many small wells in this vicinity, (the number will probably reach 150) during the coming month they not being able to pey the running expenses .-The large increase is ewing to the striking of the big wells on the McCray farm, which is at present yielding nearly 1500 barrels per day. These farms where the production is given from actual measurement by the superintendents and owners, are marked with a star; all others are estimated:

War News.

GREAT BATTLE FOUGHT THE FRENCH DEFEATED

London, August 6-8:30 p. m. The Globe on undoubted authority, says a great battle, in which many bodies of troops were engaged began yesterday, but was interrupted by darkness. It was re-sumed early this morning and continued until this evening, when victory was decided for the French. Similar rumors are current in Paris and affecting the bourse The conflict between McMahon and Crown Prince of Prussia, already mentioned, was apparently the commencement of the strug-

> London, August d-9:30 p. m. The following dispatch has just been received here:

Weisenburg-via Berlin, August 6. The Prince Royal telegraphs the followlog bulletin from the field of battle: "A victorious battle has been fought near Worth. McMalion was totally beaten by de larger portion of my command. The French retired from Bitsche." (Signed)

FRED'S WILLIAM, Prince Royal. Field of battle hear Worth, 4:30 p.m. Berlin, August 7-The following official dispatches have

Mayence August 6-6:10 p. m .- The French turned back on their entire line and commenced to retreat towards the interior of France.

The French had commenced to advance from Saarbrucken, which they had held since the famous battle of three divisions against three companies of Prussians, but having to fall back they burned that rich and unprotected town, and in withdrawing spread the conflagration by throwing hot shot into It.

Saarbrucken, August 9-7 p. m. The town of Saarbrucken has just been retaken by the First Prussian Artillery Corps, under Steinetz.

Mayence, August 6 The heads of the Prussian columns approached the Saar on the 5th. This mornng General Kemers found the enemy torth of Saarbrucken in a strong position in the mountains near Spierheren, and commenced immediately to attack them. Following the sound of the cannon, portions of the divisions of Barnokow and Stupungen came up. General Goeben took command and after a very severe fight the position occupied by Frossard was taken by assault .-Generals Francois and Colrenter are among the wounded.

Mayence, August 7-4 a. m. The Prince Royal reports, August 6, evening: In the battle in which we defeated McMahon, whose corps had been reinforced by divisions from the corps of Feilly and Canrobert, we have taken two eagles and at least 4,000 prisoners. Gen. Baze was wounded. Loss great on both sides.

Mayence, August 7 6 a. E. General Goeben reports concerning the fight west of Saarbrucken: Many hundred prisoners were taken. From these we gather that Frossard's corp was engaged. Our force in action was four divisions. Night alone put an end to the fighting. The enemy covered his retreat by a heavyfire of artillery. Gen. Francois is deal -Loss heavy on both sides.
