Buffalo Races—Opening Day.

Buffalo, August 8.—The Buffalo Park Association had a brilliant opening of summer meeting to-day. The unprecedented premium of \$40,000 attracted visitors from every part of the United States and Canada. The finest horses in the country are on the grounds. About ten thousand persons attended the frolics to-day. The weather was fine and the track and grounds in excellent order. In the first race for a purse of \$2000 for horses that have never beaten 2:34, \$1,200 to the first horse, \$500 to the second and \$300 to the third. Ten horses entered.

Latest and Most Important War News.

New York, August 9. A dispatch to a prominent banking house, from London, says: A revolution in Paris is imminent. The rumor of the death of Napoleon is not certain, but probable.

Rome, August 8. The last of the French army of occupation has left Civita Vecchia.

Paris, August 9. The following official dispatch is dated at Hamburg, in Palatinat, 9:15 a. m. August 8th: After the battle of Worth the enemy retired in the greatest disorder. The French artillery endeavored to make a stand at Neiderfanden, and that town was taken by the Bavarians. The enemy retired on the route to Bitsche. The cavalry of Wurtemberg captured the enemy's stores and four pieces of artillery at Reibstafen. The dead and wounded covered the route of the retreating army. This morning we have occupied Hagenu, evacuated by the enemy. The German troops hold both banks of the Saar, having occupied Sarrequeines and Forbach after slight resistance by the French.

Paris, August 9. There is an immense uprising of the people of France to repel the Prussian invasion. It is said officially that two millions of men are ready to march; that the reserve corps will number one million, and the people are clamorous for organization and leaders.

New York, August 9. A London special to the New York Herald says: A dispatch from Carlsruhe to-day states that Strasburg is surrounded by sixty thousand troops, mostly South Germans, and must surrender as the garrison numbers only 7,000 men, although this does not include the National Guard of the city.

Metz, August 9, 8:30 a. m. The enemy is in a large measure concentrated in front of Metz. Marshal Bazaine has the direction in operations. The corps of Gen. Frossard has retired in good order on Metz. All quiet during the night. The Emperor has just gone to the general headquarters of Marshal Bazaine.

London, August 9. Authentic advices from France show that Bazaine, Commander-in-Chief, has 130,000 men at Metz. McMahon 50,000 at Staverne, and Caurobert 50,000 at Nancy. General Traeber has entered upon the duties of Major General of the Army.

Berlin, August 9. The losses of the French in the battle of Worth on Saturday were 5,000 dead, wounded and missing, and 6,000 prisoners.—McMahon's baggage, and many cannon and two long railway trains with stores and ammunition were captured. The Prussian cavalry in their pursuit bagged thousands of stragglers who had thrown away their arms.

Total Prussian loss 3,500, dead and wounded.

The Atlantic and Great Western Railway.

General Wright, Commissioner of Railroads for the State of Ohio, has received a letter from James McHenry, dated London, June 25, in which he says:

"I am determined that the real owners of this railway shall have the benefit of its possession. I will make it fulfill the object. Its present position is a disgrace, and prevents other Railroad Companies from receiving pecuniary aid in Europe. Its insolvency is a fraud, conceived and maintained by men well known to me, to secure for themselves the fruits of my labor, and of the confidence shown in my representations, by the people of Europe. I believe our earnings are understated to the extent of three or four millions a year and that your State is defrauded of its taxes on that amount, of its proportion thereof."

Mr. McHenry says further that the total liabilities of the Atlantic and Great Western Railroad, including all classes of stock, bonds, debentures, and floating debt, do not exceed the authorized amount of capital stock, namely, \$20,000,000.
