Buffalo Races—Second Day.

Over twenty thousand persons were present at the races yesterday. The weather was beautiful, and the assemblage the most orderly and respectable ever seen on the park. The trots were highly exciting and satisfactory. David A. Gage, of Chicago, assisted as starting judge. The first race was for a purse of \$20,000 for horses that have never beaten 2:30, \$8,000 to first horse; \$4,500 to second; \$3,000 to third; \$2,500 to fourth, and 2,000 to fifth. Eight horses were trotted, but the first heat was declared off, on account of an accident to William Brown, the driver of Harry Harley which caused considerable excitement.

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Latest and Most Important War News.

Berlin, August 10—11 a. m. Official dispatches from the army headquarters state that the results of the battle at Saarbruck Saturday were more important than were at first supposed. Frossard's corps was dispersed, the entire camp and many magazines were captured, prisoners by thousands were taken and the number is hourly increasing. The French loss must have been immense. Their forces disappeared from all points in our front and none were to be seen by our patrols, who were within gun shot of Metz.

Paris, August 10. An official dispatch from Metz, at 8:30 this morning, says: This morning the Emperor has gone to visit cantonments of the army. The ardor and enthusiasm of the soldiers hourly increases. The signal for battle is eagerly awaited. Gen. Garnier is placed on the general staff and his presence has an excellent effect.

London, August 10, 12 m. Gen. Dumont will take command of a division of the French army. Of the 77th regiment of the line engaged at Saarbruck, only eighty men and four officers reported after the fight.

Paris, August 10. The Journal Official says: No important action has taken place at the front since Saturday. Marshal Bazaine has made some reconnoitres with cavalry which have elicited information of the position of the enemy. In one of these a squadron of hussars encountered a detachment of Prussian Uhlans and drove them back, killing one officer and wounding another.

London, August 10. The result of Saturday's fighting is generally attributed to the Emperor's military incapacity. The Prussian advances were obstructed by villages filled with French wounded. The French losses exceed all estimates. The Prussians took multitudes of prisoners.

Nature's Gasometers.

Twenty-five miles south of Rochester, at West Bloomfield, Ontario county New York there is a wonderful gas well or fountain, it is believed, of being profitably used for illuminating and heating purposes. The volume is very great, and the quality of the gas has been ascertained, by careful experiment, to be uncommonly good, the ordinary impurities of coal gas not appearing in it to any damaging extent.

For the last five years this gas well has been made the study of scientific men, with a view of employing its supply for light and fuel, and at this moment the citizens of Rochester are discussing the practicability of lighting that city from this exhaustless natural reservoir. Professor Lattimer, of the Rochester University, acting in the interest of a company of capitalists of Elmira, has made a thorough examination of the gas, and last week tested its illuminating power by the aid of the most delicate photometrical apparatus, in the presence of a large number of stockholders and of prominent men of Elmira and Rochester. The result was in the highest degree satisfactory, and it seems probable that the project of lighting Rochester from this well will be carried into effect.

The village of Fredonia, in New York State, has been lighted from natural sources for many years, and at Erie, Pa., the gas from the gas wells is used to drive flour mills, and to pump up the water which supplies that city, thus making the water works company also a gas company.

IMPORTANT TO LETTER WRITERS TO GERMANY.

Those of our readers having friends in Germany will be interested to know that the direct line of steamers heretofore playing between New York and Bremen and Hamburg, respectively, having suspended trips to those parts in consequence of the French and Prussian war, the reduced rates of postage chargeable under the existing postal convention with North Germany, on letters and other correspondence for the North German Union and countries beyond forward by the direct route, are for the present inoperative. All correspondence for North Germany will consequently, until direct steamship service is resumed, be forwarded by closed mail via England, subject to the rate of international postage established for the route, viz: For letters, 10 cents per each half ounce or under prepayment optional, or payment compulsory for books, packets 8 cents each four ounces or fraction.
