Latest and Most Important War News.

Antwerp, August 12—10 a. m. Advice from the east of war state that a great battle is momentarily expected.

Berlin, August 11—Midnight. A party of French wounded are just in. All are being forwarded to Spandan today.

London, August 11. From the best information that can be gained, it appears that the garrison of Strasburg consists of only one regiment of foot and a small force of National Guard.

Supplies in the place are in proportion to the garrison, and a siege is therefore impossible; and the capture of the place will probably be an easy matter. The First Prussian Corps De Army is at Philippsburg.

Paris, August 11. The Journal Official publishes a decree declaring the department of Haute-Garonne in a state of siege.

Stuttgart, August 12. In the battle of Worth, the First Corps of Wurtemberg contingent lost 6 officers and 23 men killed; 257 wounded and 118 missing. At Gersweiler the Wurtemberg troops captured one mitrailleuse, three cannons, one staff carriage of the Fourth Division, 2,200 prisoners and 500 horses.

Paris, August 12. Advice from headquarters represent that the best understanding exists between Bazaine and other generals. Among the German prisoners taken at the beginning of the campaign are members of the Landwehr, who were called into service six weeks ago. This proves that Prussia expected war before it was declared, and was not taken by surprise, as her Governor has repeatedly asserted.

Berlin, August 12. The Bavarian army has passed through the vorge, and bivouacked last night at Dueroring.
