Latest and Most Important War News.

London, August 25. Private advices from Paris received by mail, contain the following: A Chalons correspondent of the 11th last, says, the Crown Prince is marching towards Paris with 150,000 men. It is uncertain whether they will be able to avoid a fight before going turther.

The Pruesian officers don't believe that Paris will resist them. They expect an insurrection will follow on the appearance of the Prussians which will result in the displaceme t of the present French authorities, when a peace may be easily guaranteed. They say the war will be purporcless if these points cannot be effected.

Paris, August 24. Telegraphic communication with all points in the Departments of Aube and Cote D'Or is ent off.

The Minister of the Interior authorizes the statement that additional advices of a favorable character have been received from the armies in the field; but that information is purposely withheld, as some journals indiscretely give details which should be kept back.

London, August 24. Paris dispatches say.

Minister Nary at the session of the corps Legistaff was as reticent as the rest of the Government officials. He intimated, however, that good news might shortly be expected from the front.

Paris, August 25. La Liberte says: Senators Mellinet and Betrid have been appointed on the committee of defence.

The journals continue to blame Prince Napoleon for absence at such a critical time.

La Liberte advises the Chambers to inquire, into the matter.

The National Gardes beld several meetings to-day, at which it was resolved that no proposition looking to peace ought to be entertained so long as the Prussian army is on French territory.
