Latest and Most Important War News.

London, August 26.
A Special correspondent at Bar Le Duc writes that Bazaine is surrounded in Metz by Prussian troops and is expected to be compelled to capitulate, his troops being short of provisions.

Carlsruhe, August 26.
Heavy fighting commenced last night at the town of Shevach, 10 miles from Montmedy, in the direction of Boeziers.

The Prussians cut the railway between Chauvigny and Lamontilly.
The wounded are brought to Montmedy.

The gates of the city have been closed, and an assault is momentarily expected.

Rome, August 26.
The conduct of the French Legion in demanding to return to France was so menacing that the Pope dismissed the troops at once.

Paris, August 26.
The environs of Metz have been inundated by order of the French authorities.

At the Council of Ministers yesterday favorable news was communicated from both French armies.

It is now certain there was no serious fighting yesterday as reported in the Figaro last night.

The Government has received information that the Prussians are no longer at Chalons and that the army of the Prince Royal has retrograded.

Orders have been given to the mounted gend. de arms to resist the raid of the Uhlans.

The Seberattles yesterday says: The Garde Mobile made a sortie defeating and killing a great part of two Prussian regiments.

Carlsruhe, August 26.
There was a severe artillery battle at Kehl and Strasbourg on Wednesday night, lasting until Thursday morning at five o'clock.

A large part of the citadel and arsenal in Strasbourg was destroyed, and many fires occurred in that city on account of a vigorous bombardment.

A French battery located at Marviene was captured without loss to the Prussians.

The French fire has destroyed about 20 houses in Kehl.


