Latest and Most Important War News.

London, August 29

The reported French victory on the Meuses in a battle in which 50,000 were slain, is false. The French accounts say that McMahon is not ready for battle. Not a word can be got from Bazaine, though his lines are still reported open.

It was Bismarck who gave the order that there should be no hait in the murch on Paris. The King acquiesced, though his generals favor looking after McMahon first and taking Paris afterwards. The Par-Islans defy the enemy to come on, and assert they will never see the inside of the city except as prisoners.

It is reported here that a great battle bad taken place between McMahou and the Crown Prince, in which McMahou was defeated.
