Court Proceedings.

Franklin, August 29.

The Court to-day was occupied in hearing motion arguments and sentencing the prisoners tried during last week.

R. T. Scott, selling liquor without license, fined \$50 and costs.

James Griffin, convicted of robbery, sentenced to three years in the Western Penitentiary.

Michael Connor, alias Mike, the Stone Cutter, convicted of robbery, four years in the penitentiary.

James Fitzpatrick, for robbery, one year penitentiary.

John Spafford, breaking and entering a tailor shop with intent to commit a felony, two years penitentiary.

Andrew Jeffreys, for robbery, one year and six months in penitentiary.

Michael Ryan, aggravated assault and battery, one year in penitentiary.

R. Burke, false pretenses, three months in jail.

James Vincent, Alex. Vincent, A. C. Vincent, Wm. McDowell, Samuel Robinson, for riot and aggravated assault and battery, each fined \$100 and ten days in jail.

Benjamin J. Vincent, same offence, one year in penitentiary.

RAYMOND OIL FIRM.—The producing well at Raymond, struck a few weeks ago was torpedoed on Tuesday last. It was yielding five barrels a day at that time. Several new wells are going down in the vicinity and a tolerably far west of the new territory will be made this fall.—Specialist.

Within a week the Guenther, Shenandoah and Brooklyn will sail for Europe, making with the Franklin, Junata, Plymouth and Richmond, already there, a fleet of seven vessels we will have in European waters by September. Secretary Hobson thinks this will be sufficient for emergencies.

Latest and Most Important War News.

London, August 29

The reported French victory on the Meuses in a battle in which 50,000 were slain, is false. The French accounts say that McMahon is not ready for battle. Not a word can be got from Bazaine, though his lines are still reported open.

It was Bismarck who gave the order that there should be no halt in the march on Paris. The King acquiesced, though his generals favor looking after McMahon first and taking Paris afterwards. The Parisians defy the enemy to come on, and assert they will never see the inside of the city except as prisoners.

It is reported here that a great battle had taken place between McMahon and the Crown Prince, in which McMahon was defeated.

A special to the Evening Telegram from London, on the 29th says: By dispatch from our special correspondent at Montigny, we have news of a great and bloody battle, begun on Sunday evening, in the immediate neighborhood of Mansson. The battle is yet undecided. The fighting is now going on between Charleville and Ardennes.

Sixty thousand troops have left Paris to join McMahon, and have already passed beyond Soissons. They are in excellent order and the best of spirits and a feeling of confidence seems to prevail.

Paris, August 28. There has been fighting all day at the village of Dues, between Steinway and Verdun. The fighting was steady from morning until night.

No particulars yet received.

Brussels, August 28. Marshal Bazaine is certainly under the walls of Metz.

There is great exultation at Berlin at the reception there of the following trophies: 4 mitrailleurs, 24 cannon and one Eagle and Prussian report.

Paris, August 29. Official dispatches state that the Prussian army continues its movement on Retel and Vaungers.

London, August 29. A letter from Paris describes the preparations for the siege as follows:

200,000 good troops are now in Paris and fresh thousands well armed arrive hourly. A new corps organized at Lyons has arrived. The gens d'arms, policemen, franc-tireurs, foresters and custom house servants, are coming in from all the departments. Eighteen thousand gunners from the fleet are stationed in the fortifications of the city. There is a strong conviction that the advance of the enemy will be checked.
