Latest and Most Important War News.

New York, August 31. The Gallardets dispatch from Paris last night says, there is little news additional to that published. It says that McMahon has an effective force of probably 200,000 men, the elite of France, and that everything is now in suspense awaiting the issue of the battle which must soon be fought in Ardenne or along the Meuse. Paris is fully prepared; is calm and filled with patriotism. All her men and youth are ready to take arms at once. The Prussian army advancing on Paris by the valley of the Aube and Seine is nothing but the Landwehr. The Prince Royal's troops have turned north to meet McMahon. The Gallardet says the peasants along the line are seriously annoying the invaders.

London, August 31. A dispatch from Caerquan says cannonading was heard south of that place all day yesterday, and late into the night. The result is unknown. The Emperor has certainly left Caerquan for Sedan.

Berlin, August 31. The King of Prussia has sent the following telegram to the Queen: Yareines, August 30. The Crown Prince has been in action with the 4th, 12th, and 17th corps, and the 14th Bavarian. McMahon was beaten and driven beyond the Meuse. Twelve guns, some thousand prisoners and material of war were captured.

A special to the Sun says: The French defeated the Prussians here. Fighting is going on at Armigny. McMahon retreats or seems to retreat on the department of the North. This dispatch has no date.

A dispatch from Bazaine, on Tuesday, the 30th, via London, the 3rd, says: The Prussians attacked McMahon's army today near Beaumont, defeated it, and drove it back on the Belgian frontiers.

The French camp fell into the hands of the Prussians. The pursuit of the French troops was continued for several miles, and was interrupted by the number of cannon and prisoners which were taken.

The extent of the battle-field was so vast that it is impossible to obtain further details at this moment.

Great dullness is reported in the Cumberland, Md., coal regions, owing to the unsettled state of trade. No mine ships more than half of what they could turn out, and some think that those who shipped the smallest amounts are the wisest.
