Latest and Most Important War News.

Brussels, Sept. 5.

The Independence Belge says sixteen Sedan surrendered it contained 70,000 soldiers.

Last night 15,000 more surrendered to the Prussians and 30,000 took refuge in Belgium.

From these figures it infers that McMahon's army did not exceed 115,000 men.

Gen. Felix Douay and staff have arrived here.

It is reported that the Orleans princes have gone to Paris.

London, Sept. 5.

Verdun and Montmedy still hold out against the Prussians.

The bombardment of Strasbourg continues vigorously.

Much damage is inflicted. Stubbornness prevails.

The splendid Cathedral has been partially burned and the wonderful astronomical clock and chime of bells in the tower is badly injured.

There is a freshet in the Rhine and the waters very high and many dwellings in the neighborhood of Strasbourg have been washed away.

Paris, Sept. 5—noon.

Enormous crowds are now about the corps-legistaff building where the deputies are to meet at one o'clock.

Military precautions to preserve order have been taken on large scales, though the people do not seem inclined to rioting.

They are much excited and determined.

The masses of the people from all parts of the city, are going towards the legistaff buildings, shouting "a la chambre," "Decheance," &c.

Thousands among them are members of the National e Garde who, without arms, join in shouting, and urge all they meet to go to the Legistaff building.

It is hoped the measures taken will secure quiet.

It is reported that General McMahon's dead.

Paris, Sept. 5.

Midnight—As the proclamation of the Ministers, announcing the capitulation of McMahon's army and the Emperor becomes known the excitement among the people became indistinguishable.

All evening great crowds occupied the place De La Concorde.

It being known that stormy scenes had taken place in the corps legistaff.

The story of the capture of the Emperor was fully circulated, but was not credited.

It was reported that a dictator ship would be announced and a secret meeting would be held.

The crowd anxiously awaited news.

There was a large police force on the grounds but there was no violence.

At last the crowds separated.

At this hour many of the streets are crowded with anxious and excited people, but there is no disorder.
