dent Grant has instructed Secretary Fish to issue a proclamation recognizing the new French Republic. Paris, Sept. 5-9 p. m.

The Republic has been proclaimed in all the great towns and cities.

London, Sept. 5. Count Bismarck telegraphs officially to London:

"I bave spoken with the Emperor Napoleon about peace, but he has answered that as far as he is concerned he has no power and that all depends on the Regency in Paris. Thus the capture of the Emperor has no influence on the continuation of the war."

A special correspondent telegraphs from Berlin Sanday neon:

A private dispatch from the King's headquarters says the Crown Prince has resumed his march on Paris this morning.

After the victory of Sedan the compa were broken and the heads of column put io motion.

The King reports that he will send Napoleon to Ebrenbreitenstein. Metz is quiet.

The bombardment of Strasbourg is suspended.
