The monthly petroleum report of the Titusville Herald, which appeared this morning, places the daily production at 17,797 barrels, and the number of new wells drilling during August at 396.

WEST HICKORY OIL ITEMS.—The Tidouite Journal has the following West Hickory oil items:

Lease 6, No. 1, Cummings well, is pumping 225 bbls. No. 2 is drilling. Lease 7—No. 1 is pumping 50 bbls. Lease 2—No. 1, "Red Walking Beam," is pumping 260 barrels; Lease 9, new well drilling. 10 and 4 are drilling. Lease 3—No. 1 is abandoned. Neyhart No 1 is pumping 225 barrels. No. 2 is down 400 feet.

On the Fagundas farm 12 wells are producing 1,000 bbls.

On the McCalmont farm there are 2 wells drilling, Phil. Marr pumping 10 bbls.

Satley farm, No. 1 drilling.

On the Tuttle Farm the following is the state of things at present: Lease No. 1, 20 acres, well No. 1, owned by Messrs. Irwin & Bird, of Petroleum Centre, is pumping 50 bbls. No. 2 is tubing.

Lease No. 2.—Venture well, No. 1, 100 bbls per day. Gilchrist & Calvert well on the reserved ten acres is pumping 50 barrels of oil.

On lease No. 3, Fisher & Harrington No. 1, is pumping 75 barrels; No. 2, 60 bbls.

On the Benson tract well No. 1 is pumping 5 bbls.

On the Carson tract the Burt well No. 1, pumping 5 bbls.

Parkers Landing, September 9, 1870. A rumor is current here, said to come from an authentic source, that a well has been struck on Armstrong Run which is producing at the rate of one thousand barrels a day. I will send particulars, should the report prove well founded.—Pittsburgh Commercial.

We are informed that the well spoken of above is flowing at the rate of 300 barrels per day. It is known as the Walker well, and is owned by Messrs. L. P. Walker, N. B. Parker and others, of this place.

Mr. William Dillon, yardmaster of the O. C. & A. R. R., at Titusville, met with a serious accident while engaged in coupling cars at that place, on Thursday last. He was caught in the brake of the car and dragged nearly one hundred feet before the cars could be stopped. He is not in a dangerous condition although badly bruised.

The Hickory Pipe Line from Hickory to Tidouite, connects with the Iron tanks which will store 30,000 bbls. The producers can avail themselves of this storage without cost.

Latest and Most Important War News.

London, Sept. 10. The siege of Strasbourg continues with great vigor and the Prussians are making the greatest efforts to secure its reduction.

Four thousand troops are working day and night in the third line of trenches which are quite near the city and under a constant fire from the defenses. Over 20,000 citizens have been killed and the explosion of shells can be heard five miles.

Sedan, Sept. 10. There are now marching on Paris five corps d'armee. The corps of the Crown Prince and the Bavarian corps left Regoun at five o'clock. The other corps are all ordered to take up their respective positions ten leagues from Paris by the 14th inst.

Berlin, Sept. 11. King William has written to the Queen, describing his emotions on meeting the French Emperor. He says: It was overwhelming, and for a moment I could not control myself on thus meeting him whom three years ago I saw at the summit of grandeur. The Emperor was equally moved.

Rheims, Sept. 11. The official report of the battles of Sedan, show that 400 cannon were taken. The losses of the French killed, wounded and prisoners, were 140,000.

Paris, Sept. 11—Eve. There is considerable excitement in the city this evening on receipt of favorable news.

Reports are in circulation that Bazaine has succeeded in cutting his way out of Metz through the Prussian army, and is marching towards Paris. The report had a very decided effect at the Bourse, and rents advanced to 55 francs.

The Prussians are advancing on the city very leisurely. The French force evacuated Chateau de Metz before the town destroying the railroad as they went out.

London, Sept. 10. Information received at the Prussian Embassy in London makes it certain that King William has resolved to ignore the revolutionary Government in Paris, as destitute of all shadow of authority. In the event of occupying Paris he will treat only with officials recognized by the Emperor Napoleon.

The Germans are said to have lost 50,000 men in the battles around Sedan. The Asiatic cholera prevails among the troops besieging Metz.

Texas has created a new game of eucbre, which is meeting with unequalled success in that region. It takes three to play the game. One holds a revolver, another holds the cards, and a coroner holds the inquest.
