OUR GAME LAW .- For the information of our sportsmen, and others, we give be-low some interesting data relative to the time of taking, catching and killing certain game:

Patridges or Qualis shall not be killed for a per lod of three years, under a penalty of ten dotlars for each and every bird so killed.

Phensants, or ruffed Grouse, can be killed between the 1st day of August and 20th day of December.

Woodcook can be killed between the lat day of July and the 15th day of Novem-

Rabbits can be killed between the lat day of August and the first day of January.

Reed-birds can be killed between the Ist day of September and the 31st day of December.

Deer can be killed between the 1st day of September and the 20th day of Decem-

English and Gray Snipe can be killed be tween the 1st day of September and the 15th day of November.

Wild Turkey can be killed between the let day of October and the 1st day of Janu-

Fox and Grey Squirrels, can be kill ed between the 1st day of August and the 1st day of January.

Trout may be caught during the months of April, May, June and July, and only with a book and line.

London, Sept. 27. Bazaine has repudiated repeated demands and orders of the Emperor and Em-

press to surrender. Tours, Sept. 27.

The Prefect of the department of Nord. under date of Lille, Sept. 26, writes to the Minister of the Interior here as follows: The following news has been received here by a courier pigeon from Paris, dated Friday, Sept. 23rd:

The division of General Muadhay a ttack ed the heights at Ville Juif, south of Paris, which was occupied by the Prussians.

The battle began at 3 o'clock in the morn

After sustaining a sharp fire for some hours, our troops captured the redoubts of Moreling, Sayenne, Ville Juif, Pautes and Bruyer.

We occupy them now. The Garde Mobile behaved well. The enemys loss is great.

The same day a considerable number of the French made a reconnoisance and drove the enemy from the villege of Droucy.

The next day General Billamare com mander at St. Dennis, attacked the village of Plorrefite, about two miles north of St. Dennis, which the Prussians occupied in considerable force.

The enemy was driven out of the village and the French troops retreated to St Dennis unmolested.

London, Sept. 27 A deputation of workingmen waited on Gladstone to-day land urged bim to meditate between Germany and France.

Queen Victoria, yielding to public sentiment, has written a letter of cond olence to the Empress of the French.

Gen. Ulrich announces Strasbourg can hold out but a short time.

The guns of Mount Vallaine have been dislodged by the Prussians from St. Cloud. It is estimated there are now 300,000 German troops around Paris.

The siege of Metz has become close. The blockade is interrupted occasionally by exchange of active hostilities.
