The following is the decision rendered by Judge Grier on the twenty-second (22) day of September, 1839, in the United States Circuit Court at Philadelphia. The case was around three days by Charles M. Keller of New York, B. F. Lucas and S. A. Purviances of Pittsburgh, for defendants, and George H. Christy, o Pittsburgh, for plantuff.

OPINION OF JUDGE GRIER.

As I write with difficulty I can only state the conclusions to which my mind has come after a carefu-examination of this case.

The complainant has exhibited a patent dated 25th of April, 1855. This is prima facte evidence of a good title, and puts on the respondents the burden of proof that the patent is void or worthless. I need not repeat my romarks in the case of Goodysar vs. Day (3 Wall, C. C. Rep; 22%), but now adopt them as affording a rule of decision which applies clearly to the present case.

As the infringement of the patent is admitted, the only question will be as to the validity of complainants patent of April 25, 1858.

"It was after speculation had been reduced to practice," and after ropeated experiments, that the complainant succeeded in overcoming the prejudice and ignorance of the people on the subject, and persuading the public that his invention was useful; after he had established its great utility and value, and "when his genius and patient persevenine, in spite of sneers and scoffs," were completely successful, that Reed, who had before made experiments on the same subject, and was unsuccessful, imagined that he had the best right to the invention, and after purchasing one or more complainant's tore pedoes, he applied on the 1st of November, 1807, for a patent for substantially the same company or corporation called "The Reed Torpedo Company," for the purpose of printing the compalinant's invention, and supporting the expense of litigation, and thus defraud him of the fruits. They have persevered, even after the preliminary injunction very property gnanted by the District Judge.

Let a decree be emtered for complainant for a perpetual jujunction, and a Master appointed to mike an account according to the prayer of the bill.

Note.—The passage referred to by Judge Grier in his former decision, 3 Wallace, p. 299, adopted as applicable to this case was as follows:

"It is usually the case, when any valuable discovery is saade, or any new machine of great utility is invented, that the attention of the public has been turated to that subject previously, and that many persons have been making researches and experiments. Philosophers and mechanicians may have in some measure anticipated in their speculations the possibility or probability of such discovery or invention; many experiments have been successfully tried, coming very near, yet falling short of the desired result. They have produced nothing beneficial. The invention when perfected may truly be said to be the culminating point of many experiments, and the produced nothing beneficial. The may have profited indirectly by the unsuccessful experiments and failures of others, but it gives them no right to claim a share of the hc nor of the profit of the successful infentor. It is when speculation has been reduced to practice, when experiment has resulted in dispovery, and when that discovery has been preduced to practice, when experiment has resulted in dispovery, and when that discovery has been prefered dy patient and continued experiments, when some new compound, art, manufacture, or machine has been thus produced which is useful to the public, that the party making it becomes a public benefactor and entitled to a patient. "And yet when gealus and patient persevernnes have the successful experiments who did or did not come very near making a discovery or lamanist. Every ones who can invent an improvement or vary its form, claims a right to pirace the original discovery. We need not summons Morse, or Blanchard, or Woodworth to prove that this is the usual history of every great discovery invention.

"The present case adds another chapter to this long and uniform history."—2 Wallace, C. C. Reports p. 262.
