ANOTHER NEW WELL.—Well No 1, on what is known as the Sixth Ward or Pittsburg lease, J. S. McCray farm, finished tubing this forenoon, and pumping was commenced about noon. She started up at the rate of fifty barrels per day, and will undoubtedly increase to a much higher figure. The well is owned by Messrs. Brush, Blackmore, Lowrie and others of Pittsburg.

Arnold, Phinney & Derouso well No. 3, McCray farm, is being tubed to-day, and will soon commence testing. Another big well is anticipated.

Justice Reynolds was called upon night before last to perform the pleasant task of uniting in the holy bonds of matrimony, William Manston and Mary E. Grocer, of Oakland township, this county. According to the old-time custom the Justice it was supposed would "salute the blushing bride," but his extreme bashfulness and the fact of his being a married man, prevented him from acting rashly, and all he could do was to drink their health in a bumper of good wine. The ceremony was performed at the American Hotel, and the happy couple left on the evening train.

NEW OIL DEVELOPMENTS IN FRANKLIN. Since our last issue the following new wells have commenced pumping:

P. H. Watson & Co. have a new well at the Point which is the champion of the district. It commenced pumping on Tuesday evening and is doing fully fifty barrels a day of heavy oil. This is the largest lubricating oil well ever struck.

The Clark, Gardner & Scott well at the Point, which was producing eight barrels, has been increased by torpedoing to twenty barrels.

Grimm's well, at the Point, another new strike, commenced pumping on Friday last and is yielding twenty barrels.

Mitchell & Shimmans, on the Egbert tract, near the Point, also a new strike, is doing 20 barrels.

Thomas Chess & Co.'s new well at the Point, noticed last week as in progress, commenced pumping, after being torpedoed on Monday last, and is yielding about 16 barrels.

A new well near the lower French creek bridge is producing about 5 bbls.

The Adams & Co. well, on Elk street, at J. & F. Railroad bridge, was torpedoed on Wednesday afternoon and started up at the rate of about 25 barrels a day. This well had been doing two barrels a day before torpedoing.—Venango Spectator.

WELL BURNED ON CHERRY RUN.—On Tuesday night the producing well owned by H. Camp and Camp & Co., located on Cherry Run near Rouseville, took fire through the carelessness of the engineer, and both were destroyed. The property destroyed consisted of two engines, one large boiler, engine house, one derrick and rig complete, one tank containing 80 or 90 bbls of oil. When the tank burst, the burning oil ran down to another well on the adjoining lease, setting fire to that and destroying tank, derrick, engine, rig, etc. The disaster shuts down five good producing wells. The engineer of the Camp wells is said to have been fast asleep.—Herald.

FATAL ACCIDENT.—The Times says: Yesterday, shortly after noon, an employee of the Jamestown & Franklin railroad, while attempting to get on a moving train, at the gravel pits near Reno, was thrown under the cars and instantly killed. His body was brought to Oil City and Coroner Larue was summoned, who empanelled a jury which, after examining into the case, rendered a verdict in accordance with the facts.

PETROLEUM NEWS.—The Humphrey & Tomlinson well at West Hickory has steadily improved since it was struck, and was doing yesterday about 150 bbls per day.

The report of a new 200 bbl well near Enterprise is premature and exaggerated, though the well struck by Bruce McKinney on Pine Creek two weeks since, [was torpedoed and has since produced nearly 100 bbls per day. This well did before being torpedoed, about 8 barrels per day, and will probably settle down to a twenty barrel well. Territory in this vicinity is looking up.—Herald.

PETROLEUM CHARTERS.—A New York letter says: "The following petroleum charters from Philadelphia have been registered during the three days past: A North German bark, 6,500 bbls to Bremen, at 4s; a British ship, 7,000 do. Antwerp, 4s; a bark, 1,800 do to Elsinor, for orders, 7s 6d; a British bark, 3,500 do to Rotterdam, 5s; one 4,000 do to a German port in the North Sea, 5s; a Scandinavian bark, 3,000 do to Copenhagen, 6s; a British ship, 6,500 do to Havre or Hamburg, 5s; a British brig, 1,700 do to Bristol, 5s 6d; and a Dutch brig, 900 do to Rotterdam, 4s 6d."

Latest and Most Important War News.

New York, Sept. 29.

The startling news of the massing of an immense Russian army on the frontiers of Prussia, is conveyed this morning in a special dispatch from a London correspondent.

It is stated in addition that the Russian Minister at the Court of Berlin has been instructed to demand of Prussia a full and categorical explanation of her purposes and policy in continuing the war with France. There is great uneasiness in Berlin and London.

It is also stated that Russia, while she has been supposed to be threatening Turkey, has really offered to guarantee the sublime Porte against an attempt of the Khedive to take advantage of existing European difficulties to establish the independence of Egypt.

Tours, Sept. 29.

A report having reached here of the capture of Strasbourg, the government this morning published a dispatch from the French Consul at Bash contradicting it. The Consul says the Prussians had made three tremendous but unsuccessful assaults on Strasbourg, in which they suffered heavy losses. A white flag subsequently displayed as a truce to bury the dead, gave rise to the rumor that the city had capitulated.

London, Sept. 29.

The Moscow Gazette says: Russia loses power because France is no longer a counter poise to Prussia, who can insult her neighbors with impunity.

Tours, Sept. 29.

It is announced that dispatch balloons have been sent up from Paris daily.

Advices received to-day from the capital report successes for the besieged in various minor engagements around the city.

The Mobile Guards behave extremely well under fire.

The removal of the Government from Tours is no longer talked of.

The following dispatch has been received by the ministers:

"Orleans, Sept. 29.—The enemy, who yesterday was at Cetratone, the first station on the railroad north of this city, appeared to be retiring. It is believed news of a serious check near Paris, occasioned their retreat.

London, Sept. 29.

The French garrison of Strasbourg has been removed to Rastadt in Berlin, as prisoners of War.

The Prussians have already occupied the town.

The Prussian Generals are to formally enter the city to-day.
