The following is the decision rendered by Judge Orier on the twenty-second (22) day of September, 1899, in the United States Chemit Court at Philadelphia. The case was argued three days by Charles at Keller of New York, B. F. Lucas and S. A. Purvance of Pittsburgh, for defendants, and George Harding of Philadelphia, and George H. Christy, of Pataburgh, for plaintiff.

OPINION OF JUDGE GRIER.

As I write with difficulty I can only state the conclusions to which my mind has come after a careful-examination of this case.

The complainant has exhibited a patent dated 25th of April, 1895. This is prima facic evidence of a good title, and puts on the respondents the burden of proof that the patent is void or worthless. I need not repeat my remarks in the case of Goodynar vs. Day (2 Wall, C. C. Rep. 223.) but now adopt them as affording a rule of decision which applies clearly to the present eyes.

As the infringement of the patent is admitted, the only question will be as to the validity of complainants patent of April 23,1808.

"It was after speculation had been reduced to practice," and after repeated experiments, that the complainant succeeded in overcoming the produce and ignorance of the people on the subject, and persuading the public that his invention was useful; after he had established its great willity and value, and "whom his genius and patient perseverance, in spite of smeers and scoffs," were completely successful, that Reed, who had before made experiments on the sume subject, and was unsuccessful, imagined that he had the best right to the invention, and after purchasing one or more complainant's tor pedoes, he applied on the list of November, 1807, for a patent for substantially the same combinations of devices and machine contained in company or corporation called "The Reed Toppedo Company," for the purpose of pirating, the complainant's hereinform and supporting the expense of llingation, and thus defraud him of the fruits. They have persevered, even after the preliminary injunction very properly granted by the District Index.

Let a decree be entered for complainant for a perpetual injunction, and a Master approinted to take an account according to the prayer of the bill.

Note.—The passage referred to by Judge Grier in his former decision, 3 Wallace, p. 209, adopted as applicable to this case was as follows:

"It is usually the case, when any valuable discovery is made, or any new machine of great mility invented, that the attention of the public has been tarned to that subject previously, and that many persons have been making researches and experiments. Philosophers and mechanicians may have in some measure anticipated in their speculations the possibility or probability of such discovery or invention; many experiments have been successfully tited, coming very near, yet failing short of the desired result. They have produced nothing beneficial. The invention when perfected may truly be easily to be the culainaling point of many experiments, not only by the inventor, but by many others. He may have profited indirectly by the trastices of the entire of the profit of the successful inventor. It is when speculation has been reduced to practice, when experiment has resulted in dispovery and when that discovery has been perfected by partiest and continued experiments, when some new compound, art, manufacture, or machine has been thus produced which is useful to the public, that the party making it becomes a public benefactor and entitled to a patent. "And yet when gaints and patent persevenued have at length succeeded, in spite of success and ecoffs, some valuable invention or discovery, how seldom is it followed by reward! Envy robs him of the honor, white speculators, swindlers, and plants to him of the profits. Every unsuccessful experimenter who did or did not come very near making a discovery now claims it. Every one who can invent an improvement or vary its form, claims a right to pirate the original discovery, we need not summens Morse, or Blanchard, or Woodworth to prove that this is the usual history of every great discovery or invention.
