THE ELECTION.

Below we give the election returns for this precinct. On the County ticket for Congress Gillilan, Rep., has a majority, and Keenan, Dem., for Assembly, is ahead. It will be seen that for Judge and Inspector of Elections the Democrats have a majority of 22, they being the only offices in which a straight party vote was maintained. Smith, Rep., was elected Judge by the Cherrytree vote polled in this precinct. There was an unusual amount of cutting and pasting done by both parties. The Democratic township ticket was elected throughout. Fetterer's majority over Hixon is about 40, and Walters majority over Lawrence, 47. The ballot is as follows:

Latest and Most Important War News.

London, Oct. 11. A detachment of the army of the Crown Prince, under General, Von Derhaun, defeated a portion of the army of the Lore yesterday, near Orleans, taking 1,000 prisoners and three pieces of artillery. The Prussians were surrounded until repulsed at Cherizy, but rallied, and taking possession of the place set fire to it, and the town is in ruins. The French say the Prussians have also burned several villages in the plains of Benance. Advice from Metz to Sunday, say the weather is unfavorable. Firing from the works is steadily maintained. The Prussians took two thousand prisoners in the last encounter. It is stated Lord Lyons recently suggested to Bismarck the expediency of an armistice. Bismarck replied that Prussia would be glad to make peace any time and any where, but no proposition looking to a truce could be entertained for a moment.

THE BIG WELL AT RENO.—This well which is owned by and located upon the land of the Reno Oil Company, is situated upon a ridge about one-half mile back from the river. The following information concerning this well will be found reliable: Driving pipe was put down thirty-four feet before striking the rock. The well was then drilled through 5 1/2 inch casing 173 feet, and was dry to the very bottom. At a depth of 635 feet the drill struck a gray sand rock fifteen feet in thickness. Underneath this rock a strata of slate nine feet in thickness was found, and in every well put down by this company on this tract the same thickness of slate has been found, and underneath a second strata of oil sand.—The well at this juncture was thoroughly sand pumped, and drilling was resumed, when at a depth of about seven inches the oil was thrown above the derrick and the well ran up to last Saturday, barreled up 657 barrels of oil every 24 hours. A steam gauge was adjusted to the casing of this well, that shows a pressure of gas equal to 65 lbs to the square inch, a power sufficient to run any engine.—Herald.

PETROLEUM ITEMS.—A new strike known as the Little well was made on the Norway Oil Co.'s tract of land, 1300 acres in extent in President township and opposite Eagle Rock. This well was torpeded October 6th, and was raised from four to twenty-five barrels daily. The oil is of light green color. The owners are Wm. P. Johnson of Titusville; L. Halderman, of Cleveland, and Geo. Allen and others of Franklin. The company intend putting down several wells this fall.

Hoolley, the Brooklyn minstrel manager, has purchased Bryan Hall, Chicago, for \$170,000, and is to make an African Opera House of it.
