THANKSGIVING.

By the President of the United States.

A PROCLAMATION.

WHEREAS, It behooves a people sensible of their dependence on Almighty God publicly and collectively to acknowledge their gratitude for his favor and mercies, and humbly to beseech for their continuance; and

WHEREAS, The people of the United States, during the year now about to end have special cause to be thankful for general prosperity, abundant harvests, exemption from pestilence, foreign war and civil strife.

Now, therefore, be it known that I, ULYSSES S. GRANT, President of the United States, concurring in any similar recommendations from Chief Magistrates of States, do hereby recommend to all citizens to meet in their respective places of worship on Thursday, the 24th day of November next, to give thanks for the bounty of God during the year about to close, and to supplicate for its continuance.

In witness whereof, I have hereunto set my hand, and caused the seal of the United States to be affixed.

Done at the city of Washington, this 21st day of October, in the year of our Lord 1870, and of the independence of the United States the ninety-fifth. U. S. GRANT.

THE STRAY LAW.—We are frequently interrogated in reference to the mode of treating stray horses, cattle, sheep, &c.—The law on this subject is in substance as follows:

Whenever a stray beast is found trespassing on the premises of any one it is the duty of the party to give notice to the owner thereof under the penalty of \$5, if he can be found, and within four days deliver to the Town Clerk a full description of the kind, marks, color or any other natural or artificial marks of such stray or strays, together with the fees, which are for a horse, 50 cents; cattle, 25 cents, and each sheep, 6 cents. If the owner does not appear within ten days after such stray or strays to be advertised for three weeks at least in one newspaper. And if the owner shall not appear within sixty days after such advertisement, and settle all reasonable costs and damages, the person taking up the said stray shall make application to a Justice of the Peace, in said township, who is required to issue his warrant to the Constable whose duty it shall be to sell the same at public sale, first giving ten days notice of such sale by at least three printed or written handbills. And after he shall have sold the same, he shall make return of the proceeds to the said Justice, who shall after paying all reasonable damages and costs of keeping as aforesaid, pay over the surplus if any there be, to the County Treasurer; but if the owner shall appear within one year of such sale, and prove his property to such stray, the said Justice shall certify the same to the said Treasurer, who shall pay the owner the whole amount of such surplus; but if the owner shall not apply within the time aforesaid he shall thereafter be debarred from recovering, and the money aforesaid may be applied to county purposes.

Captain Terry, of the American brig Waverly, reports that on September 3d, at 1:30 p. m., off the Rio de la Plata, they were struck by a tornado or whirl of a singular character, and without any warning whatever, carried away the foremast head above the eyes of the rigging, the foretopmast, topgallantmast, mainmast, foretop and jibboom, sails and yards, all went over the side together into the water in one crash. No wind blew the foreyard nor abaft the foremast, nor do I think that there was any wind above the topsail yard as none of the light sails were split or torn. It struck like a cannon ball and passed as quick—the ship did not career one atom.—I think the gust was perfectly round and about twelve feet in diameter.

A social party is to be given at the Oil Exchange Hotel, this evening, which it is expected will prove the affair of the season. Mine host Johnson has an old-time reputation for getting up pleasant and agreeable parties, and no doubt there will be a goodly number in attendance.

A squirrel hunt took place at Sagar Grove, Warren county, recently, twenty men being engaged on each side. They killed in one day 533 squirrels, besides fifty-three birds.

Latest and Most Important War News.

Stuttgart, Oct. 25.

Gen. Cackow telegraphs to the government here on Sunday, that the French made a sortie across the Marne at Joinville on Friday last, against the Wurtemberg outpost.

Three French battalions with artillery and mitrailleuses engaged our forces from that Point—Joinville and Champigny.

They were bravely repulsed by the second rifle battalion and part of the Seventh regiment.

The Wurtembergers lost two killed and wounded.

Lay Loape, Oct. 24.

A large force of Prussians were at Courville to-day, and their scouts appeared at Pontgania, but in the evening they returned to Chartres, after blowing up the bridge at Landells.

Fifteen members of the National Guard were shot by the enemy at Joney.

Besancon, Oct. 24.

The invaders are retreating from Chastillon Le Duc, taking seventeen wagon loads of wounded.

They left a large number of dead on the field, among them a colonel of Baden cavalry.

Neuf Chateau, Oct. 24.

Friday night the Prussians attempted to bombard Verlan, but their plans were discovered by the gallant and successful sortie of the Garrison.

Our troops charged with the bayonets and killed numbers of the enemy.

Two bodies of the besiegers, mistaking each other in the night for enemies, fought for hours and suffered heavy losses.

A New Jersey paper notes that Wm. H. Bell, of Branchville, Sussex county, in that State, is getting up a large stock company for the purchase of about ten thousand acres of land in Pike county, Pennsylvania, which have been secured, and also a perpetual lease upon some four thousand more, the lots lying principally in Blooming Grove and Dingham townships. In this tract, deer abound, and bears are not unfrequent. All the smaller game is to be found in great profusion. There are lakes, all thoroughly stocked with pickerel and other fish, and the trout fishing is not excelled in the Adirondacks, or any other place in the Union. The improvements are to consist of a fence of great height around the preserve, with a central hotel, and shooting and fishing lodges at convenient points, with good roads cut through the wilderness. It is reported that wealthy men in New York and Brooklyn have taken hold of the project—A number of the sporting men of Sussex have also entered into it with work and means.

On Friday evening last a furious whirlwind struck the tent of Van Amburgh & Co., who were exhibiting at Belleville, Richland county, Ohio, tearing it from its moorings, strewing the canvas around promiscuously, and even overturning some of the cages of animals. There was a fearful hubbub for a time, the animals howling and the human screaming, yelling, cursing and imploring in their frenzy of fright. The elephant took advantage of the confusion to escape to the country, but was soon overtaken and secured. Quite a number of persons were injured, a little girl and a man seriously. The little girl, it is stated, has since died. The names of the injured have not been learned.
