Latest and Most Important War News.

London, Oct. 29.

Yesterday the Prussians made attempt to cut the line of communications between Amiens and Rouen.

They were beaten off without accomplishing their object.

There was a slight skirmish at Normie yesterday, in which the French were successful.

Some houses were burned from artillery fire.

The Prussians were driven from the field with the loss of one gun.

Tours, Oct. 29.

Owing to the rumor of Bazaine's capitulation, Minister Gambetta has issued a circular to the prefects saying:

I have received from all sides grave reports, the veracity of which, in spite of all efforts cannot be established substantially.

It is said Metz has capitulated.

If so, it is well that you have the opinion of the Government on the matter.

Such an event could but be the result of a crime; the authors of which should be outlawed.

Be convinced that whatever may arise, nothing can abate our courage in this epoch of rascally capitulation.

There exists one thing which neither can nor will capitulate—that is the French Republic.

Berlin, Oct. 29.

News of the capitulation of Metz was communicated to Napoleon yesterday.

The Emperor's house is in great suspense and consternation.

London, Oct. 29.

There is no confirmation of the rumored revolution in Paris or fighting at La Villette.

The Pittsburgh Post records a new phenomenon at the Sappho well at Kittanning. The well has been sunk 1,025 feet. Though no oil has been discovered, large quantities of salt have been thrown up by the gas.

PARKER'S LANDING OIL DISTRICT.—Five wells are down and pumping on Longtree Island, nearly opposite the mouth of the Clarion river, and four others are drilling.

The Gipsy Queen, on the west bank of Hovey run, Robinson Farm, has been torpedoed once, and has been pumping for several days about forty barrels per day.

The Pharos well on the east bank of Hovey run, Robinson farm, has been torpedoed twice, and has been pumping about twenty barrels of oil for some time past.

The Independent says it is informed that the Jennings well on Armstrong run, near Brady's Bend, was drilled nearly through the third sand during the early part of the week, and that it has since been throwing oil in larger quantities than any well on that territory.

A new well was struck on the Siverly farm, above Oil City, on Friday, which promises to be a good paying well.

Arrangements have been made for a Union Railroad depot at Kansas City, 500x1000 feet dimensions, to cost \$750,000.

"The entire population of Cincinnati came here to witness the Red vs. White Stocking match" says a Chicago paper.

There was a furious storm of wind and rain last evening, which continued nearly all night. We learn that several derricks were blown down in this vicinity and other damage done.
