A Country without Greenbacks.

The Overland Monthly tells how the Mormons manage to get along without greenbacks:

Hundreds of fatmers living in reasonably comfortable circumstances, and having large families to clothe and educate, will a farmer wishes to purchase a pair of shoes for his wife. He consults the shoemaker . who avers his willingness to fornish the same for one load of wood. He has no wood, but sells a calf for a quantity of adobes, the adobes for an order on a mera load of wood, and straightway the matron is shod. Seven watermelous purchase a ticket of admission to the theatre. He pays for the tuition of his children seventyfive cabbages per quarter. The dressmaker receives for her services four squashes per day. He settles his church dues in sorghum intense egitation. molasses. Two loads of pumpkins pay his annual subscription to the newspaper. He buys a "Treatise on Celestial Marriage" for a load of gravel, and a bottle of soothing-

beans. In this primitive method, until the men. advent of the railroad, nine-tenthe of the business of the territory was conducted .--And even now, in the more remote settlements, a majority of all transactious are of this character.

Forman, petitioners, asking that an injunction might be issued restraining the directors of this road from increasing their capital stock, was heard before Hon. S. P. Johnson at Corry, on Monday last. C. H. Heydrick, Erg , of Franklin, appearing for complainants, and W. D. Brown, Esq. of Warren, for defendants



THE GREAT STORM ON LAKE ERIE .- On Sunday night and Sunday last Lake Erie was visited by th e third great loss of life and property. At Buffalo considerable damage was worked by the wind and water while at nearly every point on the lake shore more or less damage was done .--Among the disasters on the Lake are the losses of the tug J. C. Harrison, which went down off Sturgeon Point about two o'clock Monday morning; the propeller Negtune, which sank at about daylight at Cleveland; the schooner Brittania which sank off the Peninsula at Erie, and the wrecking of several schooners and turs at different points. The Luffalo Courier of Tuesday says that thus far only six lives are known to have been lost, and the captains and crews of the different vessels di splayed undaunted beroism in the recuing of life and property. This storm is reported as the severest that has visited the region of country around Lake Erle this season. The total losses to life and property have not yet been ascertained.
