New Well.—Well No. 3, Kepler & Watson lease, McCray farm, was completed on Saturday and commenced testing. She is now pumping between 30 and 40 barrels per day.

All hopes of peace between the two great powers of Europe, Prussia and France, are at an end, and the probability is that the war will be carried on to the bitter end.

Well No. 3, Mt. Moriah lease, J. S. McCray farm, was completed a day or two since, and although there was about 38 feet of excellent sand rock, yielded but little oil at starting. The well was torpedoed afterwards and commenced pumping about six barrels per day. The old Mt. Moriah well is now yielding 15 barrels daily. It is owned by Messrs. Taft, L. F. Egbert and others.

On account of the extreme length of our oil report we are compelled to omit considerable local and other news.

The prize fight between Allen and Gallagher, which has excited sporting circles for some time past, came off on Saturday near St. Louis, and resulted in the defeat of Gallagher. Sixteen rounds were fought—two—twenty-six and a half minutes.

MONTHLY OIL REPORT.

We give below our usual oil report for the month of October. The principal increase, as was the case in the month of September, was on the J. S. McCray farm, which shows an average daily production for the month of October of 2,686 barrels, against 2,326 barrels per day for the month of September, being an average increase of 360 barrels per day. The number of wells pumping on the farm in September was 24, and during the month of October had increased to 42. The average daily production per well decreased from 97 barrels in September to 64 barrels in October.—There was a decrease on the Dalzell farm of 105 barrels per day. On the Wm. McCray a decrease of 75 barrels per day; Central farm 13 barrels; Niagara farm 18 barrels, and on other farms and tracts a slight falling off is noticed, the total amount of which will more than balance the increase on the McCray and reduce the production at this point since September 232 barrels. As we predicted in our report for the month of September but little developing is being done at present, operators holding off in anticipation of the near approach of cold weather causing a decrease in the daily production in the region, which will tend to advance the price of oil, and at the same time give a new impetus to developing the coming spring. There are at present about 30 wells going down in this vicinity. We give in this report returns from several farms not hitherto reported, one in particular, the Sam. Boyd farm, owned by the Venango & Virginia Oil Company, is comparatively new territory, upon which there are several wells going down and others in prospect. The farms and tracts where the production is given by actual measurements by the superintendents and owners, are marked with a star; all others are estimated: On the first day of the month there was in iron tanks at this point, including Columbia farm, 109,100 barrels, an increase of 19,322 barrels since the first of October. During the month the shipments from this point of crude and refined was 92,938 barrels, against 92,489 during September.

SHIPMENTS DURING THE MONTH. Crude, 85,261; Refined, 7,574; TOTAL, 92,835.

The total production of the above farms and tracts for the month of October was 4,082 barrels, a decrease of 232 barrels since September. The increase for September over August was 459 barrels and for August over July 1,453 barrels.
