New Well.—Well No. 5, Arnold, Phinney & Derosse lease, McCray farm, was completed a day or two since, and is now yielding from twenty to twenty-five barrels per day.

The social party at the new hall, near the McClintock House, last night, was an exceedingly pleasant affair. Dancing was kept up to a late hour, and all enjoyed themselves to the fullest extent.

By a telegram from Little Valley, N. Y., we learn that Daniel C. Burdick, sentenced to be hanged on the 25th for the murder of H. H. Baker, (coloured), in Olean, in October, 1869, received from the Governor a commutation of sentence to imprisonment for life.

New buildings for private residences continue to be put up on the hill, back of the Lake Shore block.

The Oil Creek Junction R. R. is slowly but surely progressing up the creek to this point.

The weather is cold and unpleasant.

Snow storm this morning.

Moor, Conkle & Co. are about to drill a well on the Wilson farm.

The Phillips & Boyles well, on the same farm, will soon be completed. This is also a test well.

In anticipation of Thanksgiving our city meat markets are already well supplied with poultry of all kinds.

WELLS IN BUTLER COUNTY.—The Butler Eagle furnishes the following in regard to oil matters in that county.

The Alwilda well, on Hovey run, Robinson farm, has dwindled down to about ten or twelve barrels per day.

The Spurr well, on the north bank of Tom's run, we are informed, is now producing less than twenty-five barrels per day.

A part of the casing was dropped in the Edlio well, on the river hill, below Mike run, several weeks ago, and has not yet been removed therefrom. The workmen are still fishing with the hope of eventually extracting it.

The Harper & Hill well, on Hovey run, Robinson farm, which formerly yielded seventy barrels per day, is now down to twenty or twenty-five barrels.

The tubing parted in the Golden Gate well yesterday, while being drawn.

The Little Annie well is being torpedoed to day.

Mr. John Ralph, of Butler, informed us on Tuesday, that he was just from the Lynn well, he says that drilling is still progressing, but the third sand has not been struck yet; the well is now at a depth of 1,100 feet. Last week it was thought the sand had been struck, but this was a mistake.

The Mentor well, on the Bailey farm, was torpedoed on Tuesday and is now flowing at the rate of one hundred barrels.

No. 5, Conley farm, was torpedoed last week and greatly improved.

Considerable trouble is being experienced at the Clearfield well, No. 2, on the Bailey farm. The well is being drilled through large casing, and since entering the third large quantities of oil has been pumped from the well, and considerable gas has been contained with. On Tuesday night, work had to be suspended, the gas having increased to such an extent that it was considered unsafe to burn lights. We predict a large well.

We have heretofore omitted to mention the fact that Messrs. Weed, Bushnell & Co., have recently purchased the hardware store of Murray & Co., at Titusville, and are now carrying on the business at that point. We have had a personal explanation with the members of this firm for a long time, and take pleasure in recommending them to the citizens of Titusville and the oil regions as being fair and honorable business men, and they will no doubt succeed in building up an extensive trade.

The report that the fare has been reduced on the O. C. & A. R. R. to all points between Titusville and Irvinville is premature, although we understand the company intend doing so before long.

A correspondent of the Pittsburgh Commercial, writing from Franklin, says: Developments are increasing in the Franklin oil district. There are about one hundred wells down and going down. Some fifty or sixty of these are producing on an average about five barrels per day each.—The production of the Franklin district has been entirely overestimated, and the consequence is the price of oil has fallen from \$7.25 to \$4.75 at the wells. There is no doubt but that the exaggerated reports of the production had more to do with the decline in price than anything else, because the quantity produced here is not too much for consumption; but the dealers have held off, taking it for granted from the reported production that prices would be lower.—The producers would make more money if they would endeavor to keep down these wild cat reports.

Latest and Most Important War News.

Berlin, Nov. 17. Yesterday the garrison at Belleforte made a sortie, but were repulsed by the Prussians.

The garrison lost 200 killed and wounded and 58 prisoners.

London, Nov. 17. A late number of the Paris Temps admitted that an offensive movement on the part of Gen. Trochu could alone save the city.

All papers here speak of the Russian demand as insistent.

England will stand firm to treaty engagements, and will not stand alone.

Throughout England preparations for defense are extensive.

Gibraltar is being re-provisioned, and the Government is purchasing powder in large quantities.

In the event of a declaration of war, Egypt, Servia and Rumania will unite against Turkey for independence.

London, Nov. 17. A rumor comes from Berlin that Great Britain has renewed her demand for an armistice.

Indefinite rumors of French successes before Paris are circulating.

Liege, Nov. 17. The Journal De Liege says Russia is about to propose a conference of Powers at Brussels to revise the fourteenth article of the treaty of Paris of 1856, and that Austria and Italy are represented as favoring the project.

London, Nov. 17. The Magasin reports that the German minister Von der Tann has withdrawn from Tournay and Paris, and that their advance posts at the present moment are at Bazoches, Lille, Peix, Demignyville, Voves, Carville and Guedesville.
