The track was so badly damaged that no trains have been able to pass up to this writing, 2 p. m.-The passengers and baggage on the trains north and south were transferred this forenoon both ways. A large force of workmen are engaged repairing the track and trains will be running as usual in a short time. We did not learn what the damage was estimated at.

MONTHLY Of REPORT.

Below we give our usual monthly oil report for the month of November. As we predicted in our report for the month of October there has been a falling off on nearly all the farms and tracts in this vicinity. especially on the McCray farm. The production of this farm for the month of October was 2,686 barrels per day, and for the month of November 1,944 barrels per day, showing a decrease of 742 barrels per day. The number of wells producing on the farm in the month of October was 42, and the average per well was 64 barrels daily. The number of wells pumping during the month of November was 45, and the average per well 43 barrels daily, showing a decrease per well of 21 barrels per day. There are at present fourteen wells going down on the farm. The Wm. McCray farm decreased 7 barrels; the Daizell 40 barrels; the Woods 16 barrels; the Pearson S barrels, while the Columbia farm, Ningara farm and one or two other farms exhibit a slight increase, but not enough to balance the falling off. The total average of the farms and tracts given in our table shows a daily production of 3,630 barrels, a decrease of 452 barrels since October. The decrease in October from the September production was 232

Some developing was done during the month on tracts lying east of this, on the Sadorus, Wilson and others. On the Wilson Farm two wells were sunk with indifferent success, and five more are going down. There are probably not over 30 wells drilling in this vicinity at present, being principally located on the J. S. McCray farm, Columbia farm, S. Boyd tarm, Metropolitan tract, Cherrytree Run, and the tracts alluded to above, and not many new wells will be commenced before spring opens. The farms and tracts where the production is given from actual measurement by the superintendents, and owners, are marked with a star; all others are estimated.

On the first of the month there was in iron tanks in this vicinity 112,477; barrels, an increase of 3,377 barrels since October first.
