NATURAL GAS FOR FUEL.

The successful introduction of natural gas for fuel and light in Erie, Pa., has induced others to put down test wells, and in some instances they have been successful.

Latest and Most Important War News.

New York, Dec. 20. The Herald's Brussels correspondent telegraphs this morning that the bombardment of Paris is declared to be impossible.

It is not humanity which restrains the Prussians, but it is simply impossible to succeed, as they have neither the number or culture of guns necessary.

They have only 500 guns, mainly twenty-four pounders, and the French outworks, which command the batteries, can destroy them the moment they open fire.

A correspondent writes from Vendome that neither of the French armies commanded by Chaussey and Bourbaki number less than 100,000 men, and they can draw reinforcements from other parts of France of nearly double that number.

The appearance of the French armies is favorable. Many of the men are small in stature, but the majority are large fellows.

The prospect of peace are looking much improved this morning, and it is thought in Berlin and Frankfurt the peace basis proposed by the neutrals, with some amendments, will soon be adopted.

Military movements in the field continue active and the French are endeavoring to concentrate.

One German army is falling back before Bourbaki.

Later advices from Paris says there has been no fighting around the city since the first of December.

The people had received news from the outside to the 11th inst.

Advices have been received here announcing that the Germans were stationed at Nuits, Department of Cote-d'Or, on the 18th.

The French withdrew at nightfall. The Germans lost 300 in killed and wounded.

Among the wounded was Prince William, of Baden, who was shot through the cheek.

WANTS TO SELL OUT HIS SEX.—The editor of the New Haven Register recently attended a lecture by Mrs. A. C. Bowler, in which "the utter uselessness and coarseness of the masculine gender" received their just due.
