SEVENTY BARREL WELL AT PITHOLE.
The new well at Pithole, owned by Haskell & Rhodes, is at present yielding seventy barrels of oil daily by actual measurement. This well is located a short distance back of the Bonta House site, on the Rooker farm. It started up at the rate of forty barrels per day, and has kept increasing ever since. Considerable excitement has been occasioned by the striking of this well, and we understand a number of other wells are to be put down at once. We have no doubt but that much good territory exists in the vicinity of Pithole yet.

Latest and Most Important War News.

Paris, Dec. 23.
During the sortie from Paris on Wednesday Ducrot took many hundred prisoners and the general situation is more encouraging for the French.

No occupation of Tours, had the retreat of other Prussian forces towards Orleans are said to be the results of the strategical movements of Generals Schaefer and Bourbaki.

Rouen has been almost entirely evacuated by the Prussians.

There were only 150 German soldiers there yesterday.

General Montaut has undoubtedly moved his forces for the purpose of opposing the march of the French army.

General Faidherbe, in an official dispatch telegraphed from Lille on the night of the 23rd, says that he announced to the Ministry of War that his army engaged the enemy at Pont Noire on that day, and the battle lasted from 11 a. m. till 6 p. m.

For the greater portion of the time it was an artillery duel, which was finally terminated by a charge of the French infantry along the whole line, in which the enemy were driven back and the French troops remained masters of the field.

Northey, Dec. 23.
The official report of the battle of Northey on the 8th shows that General Greener was attacked by twenty-four thousand Prussians with a heavy force of artillery.

The French had only ten thousand men, who, after fighting many hours, retreated a quarter of a mile from the town.

The Germans lost more than five hundred killed and wounded, among them Duke William of Baden, and several colonels.

The phoebants fought bravely by the side of the regular troops.

Reinforcements came up next morning, and the Germans retreated in such haste that the prisoners they had taken the day before escaped.

The French lost was 1,200 killed and wounded.
