**LARCENY.**—Two young men who gave their names as Frank Wood and John King, were taken in custody, last evening, by watchmen Kenney and turned over into the charge of officer Lawrence, on a warrant issued by Justice Reynolds, accusing them of the larceny of a watch valued at \$8.00 from the Jamestown Clothing Store, and afterwards endeavoring to dispose of it to various parties at the Oil Exchange Hotel. Upon being brought before the Justice, the prisoners demanded a jury trial, and after a hearing in the case, the Justice returned a verdict of guilty and the Justice sentenced them to be imprisoned in the county jail at Franklin for the period of three months.

The two men claim to hail from Pittsburgh, and are evidently hard cases, one of them being caught in the act of endeavoring to pick the pocket of a lady from Plummer, at the depot night before last, by Mr. Kenney. They were taken to Franklin this morning by Deputy Hill.

The new well on the Columbia farm continues to yield fifty barrels per day. It has a powerful gas light, which lighted up at night illuminates the hills for a long distance around.

In the case of George Turner and Francis Owen, indicted for the wilful murder of wind Knightlinger, at Hydstown, on evening of the third of December last, trial was concluded at Meadville yesterday, and resulted in a verdict of not guilty.

**MONTHLY OIL REPORT.**

Below will be found our usual monthly oil report for the month of December. It will be seen that there has been a large falling off on several of the farms where the production was the heaviest, especially on the McCray farm, as shown by the following statement of the production for the two months previous. The production of this farm for the month of October was 2,686 barrels per day; for the month of November 1,944 barrels per day, and for the month of December 1,206 barrels per day, showing a decrease of 1,480 barrels from the October report, and 738 barrels from that of November. The number of wells producing on the farm in November was 45, and the average per well 42 barrels daily. The number of wells pumping during the month of December was 49, and the average daily production per well 24 barrels, showing a decrease of 18 barrels per well. There are at present six wells going down on the farm. There was also a decrease on the Wm. McCray farm of 9 barrels; on the Dezell 66 barrels; on the Niagara 30 barrels; on the Central 11 barrels; on the Pearson 9 barrels, and on others almost in like proportion. There has been no increase to speak of on any of the farms or tracts, except the Columbia farm, which shows an increase of 85 bbls. The total average of the farms in this vicinity given in our table shows a daily production of 2,819 barrels, being a decrease of 511 since November.

But very little developing is being done, and that is confined principally to the Wilson, Saorus and other tracts lying east of this. There are probably not more than 20 wells going down in this vicinity at present. The farms and tracts where the production is given from actual measurements by the superintendents and owners, are marked with a star; all others are estimates.

On the first day of the month there was in iron tanks, at this point 115,951 barrels, an increase of 3,474 barrels since Dec. first. During the month the shipments from this point of crude and refined oil was 60,323 barrels, against 92,109 during November, a decrease of 31,781.

**Latest and Most Important War News.**  
 London, Jan. 5.

The French Army of the North has returned to its encampment near Royville.

After the battle of the third Instant General Faidherbe, in an order of the day, says:

"Soldiers!—In the battle of Pont Noyelles you victoriously held your position, and at Bapaume you carried all the positions of the enemy.

This time he will not deny you a victory.

By your valor and constancy you have deserved well of your country.

As soon as we have obtained provisions and ammunition we will continue operations.

The Prussians on the morning of the 4th surprised and dispersed a French force on the left bank of the Seine, near Rouen capturing three stands of colors, two cannon and 450 prisoners.

The siege of Belfort still continues.

New York, Jan. 6.

A dispatch from Havre, dated the 5th, morning, confirms the dispatch already published of a great battle on the left bank of the Seine.

The battle has been very fierce, of a very sanguinary character, and lasted several hours, but as far as ascertained no decided advantage was gained.

The loss on the part of the Prussians was very heavy, and the French showed remarkable spirit and daring.

We learn that Col Jim Flak (Prince Erie) has through Mr. Henry Harley, extended an invitation to the Titusville Commercial Club to visit New York and accept his private hospitalities. A special train of the silver palace cars will be placed at the disposal of the Club for the round trip, and will leave Titusville on the 17th instant.—Herald.

Affairs in the new oil field of Sandy are in a promising condition. The production of the Canning well has been improved, and a good show was had in the McCray well, when unfortunately the round ramer became fastened in the third sand. Some ten or twelve new rigs have been put up, and in a very short time that number of wells will be drilling. So says the Oil City Register.

Considerable local matter is omitted on account of the crowded state of our columns.

**Funerals of Mrs. Maggie Cooper.** A school teacher of Independence, Iowa, deserves to be remembered. In the wall of her school room, high above the floor, are hanging registers, weighing about forty pounds each. One of them got loose and was about to fall. Miss Cooper saw there was no time to warn the little children beneath, and so ran up and caught the heavy book, thus being severely injured herself, but saving her pupils from harm.

All interested in codfish will be relieved to know that the prospect of our being driven to fight for that valuable article of diet is beautifully slim. The Cabinet of St. James and the London Press have respectfully intimated the appeal of New England on behalf of fish-balls for its Sunday breakfast; and there is little doubt that the vexed question of the fisheries will be amicably settled.
