**Parker Oil Field.**

The Fair Chance well, on the Pollock farm, East side of the river, was torpedoed last week, and for some thereafter pumped oil at the rate of eighteen barrels per day.

The Dunn well on the Connelly farm, was torpedoed on Friday of last week, and afterwards pumped and flowed oil for some days, at the rate of fifty or sixty barrels per day.

The Mentor well, on the Bally farm, was torpedoed some time ago, and materially improved for the time being.

No. 8, Conley farm, was torpedoed some two weeks ago, and its production increased to about thirty barrels.

The Clearfield well, No. 2, on the Bally farm has been drilled deeper, and has been pumping about 35 barrels per day, for some length of time.

The Clearfield well No. 1, was drilled deeper but not much improved thereby. — Northwestern Independent.

**Masonic.**—R. A. Lambertson R. W. Grand Master of Pennsylvania, on the 27th of December last, appointed D. D. G. M.'s for the State. For this section the following appointments were made: C. M. Hoover, of Franklin, for the counties of Venango, Warren and Forest; Madison M. Meredith, of Brookville, for the counties of Clarion, Armstrong, and Jefferson; Pearson Church, for Crawford county; Brant H. Henderson of New Castle, for the counties of Lawrence, Mercer, Butler and Beaver; Wm. Himrod, Jr., of Erie, for the county of Erie. Rev. M. S. Bylesby, of Meadville, was appointed one of the Grand Chaplains.

The Grand Chapter made the following appointments for this section: C. M. Hoover, of Franklin, D. D. G. M. P. for the counties of Venango, Clarion, Jefferson and Forest; James R. Barbour, of Titusville, for the counties of Crawford, Erie and Warren; Henry Austin, of Greenville, for the counties of Mercer and Lawrence.

A dispatch from Harmsburg says: "A serious, if not fatal accident, occurred at this place about 2 o'clock this (Friday) afternoon, at the home of Thomas Sullivan. They were burning gas in the house from the Gray Eagle well, when it suddenly exploded, seriously burning Mrs. Sullivan, who, it is thought, will not recover. The house also caught fire, and was burned to the ground."

James D. Lewis, who was arrested in Franklin for larceny committed in Crawford county, was tried at Meadville the other day and found guilty.

The U. S. District Court was in session at Erie during last week. The grand jury found a true bill against J. T. Chase, of Titusville, for embezzlement while acting as Deputy Collector.

True bills were also found against J. J. and W. Law, of Mercer county, for removing distilled spirits from distillery without paying tax, and against R. M. Wilson, of Clarion, for refusing to deliver possession of U. S. Storehouse to his successor in office.

The total amount of oil in store in Tidwate is 110,503 bbls., and at Hickory 57,199 barrels, making a grand total of 167,699 barrels.

The S. A. Woods tank, Central Petroleum Co's farm, is now filled with oil, the last barrel being run into it to-day. The capacity of the tank is 18,000 barrels. The oil comes from the McCray farm.

The "Roll of Honor" now makes twenty-five volumes, and contains a record of over 333,000 graves of deceased Union soldiers. Two volumes more will complete the work.

It is thought singular in regard to the Spotswood Hotel fire that the safes with money in them were so much more promptly recovered than the human remains.

**Latest and Most Important War News.**

London, Jan. 7.  
The Germans in the upper valley of the Oise have evacuated the towns of Guise, Hirson and Vervins, and are marching on Mezieres.

Cherbourg, Jan. 7.  
A large number of troops have left this place for the front.

Within the past three days, 600 wounded have been brought here.

Bordeaux, Jan. 6.  
A series of unimportant attacks made on advanced posts of General Chanzy's army have been ungenerously repulsed.

The franco-tireurs of Glen surrounded and captured a detachment of one hundred Germans near that place.

The force now under Chanzy's command is reported to be 200,000 strong and ready for action.

Versailles, Jan. 7.  
The German forces beyond Veaudome encountered two French army corps, which were advancing.

A severe engagement took place at which the French were repulsed, and our troops occupied Aza and Montoire and intermediate villages.

Havre, Jan. 8.  
Ten thousand Germans, mostly from Rouen, were defeated yesterday by Gen. Roy near Jumiges.

The French have since occupied Bourgoard and Bourghereuld and threaten to drive the Prussians from Pont Audimer.

A large and spirited meeting of the citizens of Franklin was held Thursday evening in the Court House to take some action in the matter of erecting a new bridge across the Allegheny river. Col. Thomas McDonough was called to the chair, and William Lee appointed Secretary. After considerable interchange of opinion, the following committee was appointed to confer with the County Commissioners and the officers of the Allegheny Valley and Jamestown Railroads, in order to ascertain what proposition, if any, they had to make looking to uniting in the building of a bridge: F. D. Klinear, chairman; M. L. Sage, Col. Jas. S. Myers, R. H. Woodburn, Wm. Brough, J. L. Hanna, R. A. Brashear, Thomas Hoag, George E. Ridgway and Col. Thomas McDonough. The opinion was unanimous for a free bridge.

A railway train was stopped near Evansville, Indiana, lately by a fiery goblin standing ahead on the track. An illuminated pumpkin proved to be the head and front of the terror. Corn husks and corn silks furnished the grisly beard; imagination did the rest.

As an illustration of the watchfulness of the Paris gunners, and the accuracy of their firing, it is stated that a German chaplain and officer, who shared the same bedroom in a chateau before Paris, neglected one night to close their shutters before lighting their bed-candle, and immediately were saluted by a shell from Fort Aubervilliers, which came crashing through their room, killing both its occupants.

At the beginning of the year 1870, there was not a mile of railroad in the Colorado territory. The summary now is: Denver Pacific, Cheyenne to Denver, opened June 24, one hundred and six miles; Kansas Pacific, Arrapahoe to Denver, opened August 15, two hundred and four miles; Colorado Central, Denver to Golden, opened September 28, sixteen miles. Total miles in operation three hundred and twenty-six.

A scientific lecturer on walking says his experiments show that one side of the body always tends to outwalk the other side. It is not possible when the eyes are shut to walk in a straight line for any length of time, and it will be found, where persons lose their way, that they almost invariably wander off to the right rather than to the left.

A sale of ready made clothes at auction took place at Lincoln, Nebraska, recently. A black walnut article, with silver trimmings, brought \$25, the purchaser being a man whose wife was very sick.

The East Brady Independent is agitating the question of a new county to be formed out of parts of Armstrong, Butler, Clarion and Venango counties, with East Brady or Brady's Bend as the county seat.

The Cabinet of St. James and the London Press have respectively entertained the appeal of New England on behalf of fish-balls for its Sunday breakfast; and there is little doubt that the vexed question of the fisheries will be speedily settled.
