NEW 100-BARREL WELL ON THE Mc-CRAY FARM.—The well located on the J. F. McCray farm, and owned by Blood Bros. J. A. Steward and John Bell, was completed and tubed last night. Pumping commenced at an early hour this morning and it is now yielding fully one hundred barrels per day, and said to be rapidly increasing. This well has 40 feet of third or oil bearing sand rock, and a strong volume of gas.

We are informed that the Roberts Petroleum Torpedo Co., have erected a nitroglycerine manufacturing plant four miles from Titusville, in this county, and will hereafter manufacture the article at that point. The manufacturing is located in a very secluded spot, and is a long distance from any human habitation. They have also made arrangements by which the danger arising from the transportation of the article is in a great measure, if not entirely, obviated.

The alarm of fire at an early hour this morning was occasioned by the gas house at the American Oil Works, in Wild Cat Hollow, catching fire from an explosion of gas. Damage very slight.

London, Jan. 11.
Gen. Faidherbe's cavalry had an encounter with the enemy on the 8th and 9th insts., and met with some success.
The Germans represent that the return fire of the Parisian forts flag perceptibly.

Bordeaux, Jan. 10.
The Monitor publishes the following news from the army of the East:
ROUENMONT, DEPT OF DANUBE, }
January 9, 1870. }

A battle was fought north of this place to-day, ending at seven o'clock in the evening, with a victory for our arms.
Night prevents us from ascertaining the full extent of our success by the General commanding.
We are bivouacked in the centre of the battle field, and all preassigned positions are occupied by our troops.
We carried Villersexel, which was the key of the enemy's position, with a shout along the line of "France and the Republic!"

London, Jan. 11.
The bombardment of the fortifications of Paris on the North, east and south sides was vigorously kept up all day Tuesday.

The French returned a moderate fire.
"Satan's Rockets" is the cheerful name for an invention of Ludre, a French engineer. The machine consists of a conical tin receiver filled with petroleum, and having at its base a chamber containing a composition with sulphide of carbon as a base, and which in combustion gives out a tremendous heat. This is put at the end of an ordinary rocket, and when it is fired and strikes the earth, a match is ignited that fires this composition and sets the petroleum alight. This rail of fire will cover a space of from twenty to twenty five yards square, according to the size of the rocket. They are manufacturing three sizes. The first throws a quarter of a gallon of petroleum; the second half a gallon, and the third a gallon. They can be thrown three and a half miles. The aim is very accurate and the effects of experiments were so disastrous that the committee of artillery officers declare no civilized nation should use it except in retaliation, and that it should be employed solely in the event of the Prussians throwing shells filled with petroleum into Paris, as they did at Strasbourg. Two hundred workmen, however, have been busied in preparing these rockets, in case their use should be necessary.

A Mount Vernon (Indiana) correspondent tells a story of "brotherhood" in which one Samuel Paine, a negro, was the victim. It appears that Joseph Able, also colored, having some difficulty with Paine, "made a contract with the devil to place a snake in Paine's hat." The manner in which this was accomplished is stated thus: "It was caught, hung up to dry, and then pulverized into a fine powder, and then placed in the path of Paine." Paine declared that he suddenly felt the body of the serpent embedded in his leg, and he knew at once that he was "wooded," but had not the power to help himself. His wife exorcised the snake by a poultice of red pepper, and when removed it was one foot in length. She threw it on the fire, and it wriggled on the floor before she caught it." These statements were sworn to before a justice of the peace.
