FORGERY.—One Isaac Simon, better known as "Champagne Charlie," who for some time past has had a cigar store on door above Robson's Billiard Parlor, was arrested Saturday night by the Sheriff of Warren county, on a charge of forgery. It appears that some days since he telegraphed to a party in Warren, representing himself as being perfectly reliable, and instead of signing his own name, signed his brother's name, who is engaged in business at Titusville. On the strength of this the Warren man sent Simon about \$340 worth of goods, which he has failed to pay for. Inquiry into the matter divulged the fact that his brother never sent the dispatch, and that it was a forgery. Simon was taken to Warren yesterday.

Latest and Most Important War News.

Versailles, Jan. 19.

The batteries southwest of Paris have been advanced to within eight hundred yards of fort Mont Kongo, which replied yesterday with one gun, on the west front. Only 150 resumed firing with two guns at long intervals.

Accounts from Paris represent a terrible state of suffering, caused by the bombardment.

Shells have fallen in St. Louis Enlisle. There has been no sortie for the last thirty-six hours.

The French outworks at Ville Juif, silenced at the beginning of the bombardment has broke out again, and four long reaching guns there are doing wild shooting over the batteries, making it uncomfortable for travelers.

London, Jan. 19—Midnight. A balloon has landed in Belgium with advices from Paris to the 13th inst.

The bombardment was causing considerable damage, but the fires occasioned by it were easily extinguished.

Some of the mills for grinding corn had been damaged, and supplies of meal were in consequence obtained with great difficulty.

London, Jan. 19—Midnight. A dispatch from Arion says the bombardment of Eligny by the Prussians continues vigorously to day.
