We acknowledge the receipt from the committee of arrangements of an invitation to attend the first annual reception of the Meadville City Lodge No. 256, Knights of Pythias, to be held at the McHenry House, in that city on Wednesday evening, March 8th, 1871. From the manner in which the invitation is gotten up we judge the reception will be a grand affair. The committee will please accept our thanks.

In the case of the Commonwealth vs. Jas. Murray, Daniel Mooney, Mrs. Murray and Miss Mooney, tried yesterday before Justice Reynolds, for drunken and disorderly conduct on Sunday last, resulted in a verdict of guilty as to Murray and Mooney, and not guilty as to Mrs. Murray and Miss Mooney. Murray was sentenced to pay a fine of \$2.00 and costs of suit and imprisonment to the county jail at Franklin for a period of 15 days. Mooney was sentenced to pay a fine of \$1 and costs and a like imprisonment in the county jail. The two women were discharged.

A meeting was held at Meadville one night last week to raise sufficient funds for developing the oil territory in that vicinity.

The particular attention of oil operators is called to our monthly oil report. We have spent considerable time and money in collecting the facts and figures necessary to getting up a reliable report. Our report may be relied upon as being as near correct as possible. Extra copies can be procured at this office.

The Pittsburgh Commercial publishes a rumor of the striking of a 200-barrel well at Queensdown, near the Armstrong Run oil territory. The well alluded to is probably No. 7. Brady's Band Iron Co.'s well, which commenced testing last night and to-day is yielding considerable oil, our informant says the stream is the full size of the pipe. The well will probably be a good one.

MONTHLY OIL REPORT.

We lay before our readers in to-day's issue our usual oil report of the production of the several farms and tracts in this vicinity for the month of February. It will be seen that there has been a considerable falling off over the preceding month, especially on the McCray farm, which shows a decrease of 413 barrels per day, the production in January being 978 barrels, and in February 565 barrelsdaily. Nearly all the other farms show a slight falling off over the month of January, while a few exhibit a small increase, but not enough to balance the falling off.

The following table shows the decrease on the principal farms:

The increase is on the Central farm, William McCray farm, Keenan farm, &c. On Cherrytree Run there has been a slight increase on the Metropolitan tract. The total average of the several farms and tracts as given in our table shows a daily production of 3,091 barrels, a decrease of 478 barrels since January.

Developing is beginning to brighten up somewhat and operators are casting about them for new fields of undeveloped oil territory. Considerable interest is at present manifested in the Wilson farm, which lies in a southeasterly direction from the McCray farm, about three quarters of a mile. One new well was struck on this farm during February, which although not a large one bids fair to hold out for an unlimited time. The striking of this well has given something of an impetus to operations in that neighborhood, and a number of other wells are going down or in prospect. The Buchanan farm, lying directly back of the Columbia farm, is also attracting the attention of operators to some extent and will be developed the coming spring. On Cherrytree considerable developing is talked of the coming month.

On the first day of the month there was in iron tanks, at this point 139,051 barrels, an increase of 5,995 barrels since Feb. 1st.

During the month the shipments from this point of crude and refined oil was 28,033 barrels, against 51,375 during January, a decrease of 23,340.

Included in our report we present a table of the production of each lease on the McCray farm from July 16th, 1870, up to March 1st, 1871, which will be found of interest; also the amount of oil held in iron tankage by Mr. McCray.
