about "scarlet women running wildly hither and thither," is a fabrication manufactured entirely out of whole cloth. With the above facts in view we consider it simply an act of justice to our citizens and business men for the Commercial to refute these Munchausen tales, and place the matter in a correct light before the public.

FAGUNDAS CITY.—A private letter from Fagundas City states that the territory in that vicinity is being rapidly exhausted, all the large wells having fallen off, so that the average proportion of the wells is only twelve barrels per day. The letter says:

"There is good reason for this falling off, as there are sixty-five wells upon forty-five acres of the Wilkins tract, which has been the cream of this territory, producing more oil than all the rest. From present appearances the price of oil must advance, as there is little prospect of finding new territory. Every point where wells have been drilled with the hope of finding new fields, have proved failures. Slate Run and Sandy give no promise of yielding operations at all remunerative, and producers are busily making the territory now in hand to the best advantage, giving no new leases and sinking no new wells. The outlook for the future supply of oil is not at all encouraging to consumers, unless new fields are open to meet the deficit occasioned by the falling off in production.

Operators are demanding a reduction of royalty on the Wilkins tract, and in most cases a reduction of from one-sixth to one-eighth has been granted.

One Cooper, a reputed Baptist preacher, upwards of sixty years of age, has been engaged for some time past in teaching school on the Clapp farm, near McClintockville, having been engaged for that purpose by the township school commissioners. Recently it has transpired that the aged reverend has been guilty of immoral conduct in the presence of the children under his care, and charges of "incompetency, immoral conduct," &c., were preferred against him.—The case was tried before the school board, on the Clapp farm, yesterday, and resulted in a verdict of guilty, and the aged individual will be discharged from that position at the end of the month.

In evidence that our citizens resented the insult offered to them in the "Sodom and Gomorrah" article published in the Titusville Courier, we may mention the fact that on Saturday over seven hundred (700) extra copies of the Record were sold and yet the demand was not filled.

We inadvertently omitted to mention in our issue of yesterday, that a large number of people were in attendance at the Catholic Church, Sunday evening, to listen to the lecture on "Rome and the Councils," by Bishop Mullen, of Erie. The reverend gentleman handled the subject in an able and masterly manner, and the lecture was listened to throughout with marked attention by all present. His description of Rome and its surroundings, including St. Peter's Church, was especially fine.

Quick Work.—Mr. Owen Gaffney who was burned out by the late disastrous fire, with commendable energy commenced rebuilding again yesterday morning, and expects to open business to-day or to-morrow at furthest. We commend Mr. Gaffney's energy to others who suffered by the fire. The probability is that new buildings will be rapidly put up on the burnt district, and that "smoky shantied Sodom and Gomorrah" will rise Phoenix-like from the ashes of the destroying element.

IMPORTANT SALE OF LAND.—Mr. P. N. Harlan, of the State of Georgia, yesterday, concluded a sale of eight hundred acres of gold lands in North Carolina, about 33 miles east of Salisbury, to our townsmen, Messrs. J. W. Irwin, Jas. S. McCray, E. W. Codrington and Wm. Weed. Mr. Harlan reserves one fourth interest in the land. The price paid was \$25,000.

Extensive preparations are making for the celebration of St. Patrick's Day in the surrounding cities and towns.

A terrible boiler explosion occurred near Cleveland, on Friday, by which one man named Beers was instantly killed, and two others of the same name fatally wounded. The boiler was torn and twisted into small fragments and scattered for a long distance around.

The express train on the A. & G. W. R. R., ran off the track near Meadville, at an early hour Saturday morning. No particular damage was done. Accidents are of almost daily occurrence on this road.

Petroleum Producers' Association.

At the monthly meeting of the Petroleum Producers' Association, held at Oil City, on Wednesday last, the following preamble and resolutions were adopted:

WHEREAS, this association has been informed that a bill has been introduced into the Legislature providing for a geological survey of the State of Pennsylvania, which, if it becomes a law, and is properly executed, will have an important effect upon the interests of trade in petroleum, therefore,

Resolved, That this association express its interest in the passage of such a law as will give to the oil regions of Pennsylvania a thorough and accurate geological survey.

Resolved, That it is the opinion of this Association that such a survey is especially important not only to the interests of this region, but likewise to the revenue of the State, and that it would tend to render business less hazardous and more systematic.

Resolved, That the representatives of the oil district be requested to exert their influence in behalf of any bill that will secure to this region a reliable geological survey.

Resolved, That the journals of this district be requested to publish these proceedings.
